

According to announcement in our issue of last week, a meeting of the ratepayers of Richmond Hill was held in the Council chamber on Friday evening, Feb. 29th for the purpose of taking into consideration the building of a town Hall. There were about fifty persons present. On motion Mr. H. A. Nicholls acted as

Secretary. The Reeve, Mr J. Brown, opened the meeting by saying he had called them together at the request of several ratepayers, and, although he did not wish to influence them in the matter, thought if they ever intended building a town Hall, now was the time to set to work. He thought a Hall could be built suitable for the village for about \$4000. Would propose to extend the time of payment say 10 years. The Central Bank was going to open a branch here, and he had reason to believe, that by building a bank in connection with the hall, we could rent the same for \$200 per annum. Cost of caretaking, ringing bell, &c., would not cost much more than at present.
