On Wednesday last, Mr. John Reynolds of the White Mills, Stayner, was almost instantly killed by the bursting of a boiler. The fireman Tom Panton and one of the millers, Jos. Knox, brother-in-law of the deceased, were very badly injured, but are slowly recovering. Mr. R. was well-known in the neighborhood of Headford and Laskay, in both of which places he formerly resided. The Stayner "Sun" in referring to the accident speaks of him as having been a young man of fine business attainments, unblemished reputation and universally respected. He was a member of the Presbyterian Church and also a valued member of the choir. His terribly sudden death has given a great shock to his many friends, and cast a gloom over the whole village.

#### Anniversary Sermons.

On Sabbath last anniversary sermons were preached to large and attentive congregations in the C. M. Church in this town, by Rev. J. E. Starr, of Richmond Hill, whose fame as a pulpit speaker attracted listeners—especially at the evening service, who do not usually attend that place of worship. The Rev. gentleman chose for his text, in the morning as the foundation, for his discourse, "The Transfiguration of Christ" as recorded in the Gospel by St. Mark, 8th Chapter, and in the evening "Elijah's Faith and Prayer"—1st Kings, 18th Chapter, and 42nd and a few following verses. We shall not presume to give a synopsis of the discourses delivered, as anything short of a full report would fail to do the speaker justice. Suffice it to say, both efforts were brilliant—and withal permeated with portraits of christian life and character—illustrative of the influence, designed by God, that the church should exert and the power of the gospel to make men better and happier here, as well as qualify them for a higher and nobler existence in the future world. The Rev. gentleman is a fluent and earnest speaker—clothes his thoughts in expressive and often-times graphic language, and from the introduction to the close of the sermons on both occasions he commanded the undivided attention of his auditory. The claims of the gospel—the claims of God upon the church and the world, were presented in terms not to be misunderstood. Those who had the privilege of being present to hear him will not soon forget the anniversary sermons of 1884 in the C. M. Church. *Newmarket Era.*
