The series of Revival Meetings held in the Methodist Church in this village were closed on Tuesday night. About one hundred gave in their names as candidates for membership. The closing scenes were very impressive. The final exhortation of the Rev. Mr. Betts to all such as had been appealed to in vain to give their hearts to God, to do so yet was very solemn. His charge to those who have expressed a desire to become members of the Church was listened to with deep attention. He urged all to persevere in their new way of life, availing themselves of all the helps the Church afforded, and to strengthen themselves by the regular attendance on all the means of grace, such as Prayer, Class and Fellowship meetings, and especially not to forget the reading of the Word of God and having set times for private prayer. In reference to the use of intoxicating drinks the Rev. gentleman was very explicit, hoping that all, old and young, would carry out their temperance views on strictly total abstinence principles alone, stating that such were the evils of intemperance around us and the light and knowledge among us, that he believed that God frowned on the use of intoxicating drinks. The Rev. Mr. Starr emphasized the remarks of Mr. Betts by denouncing the accursed traffic, urging all to keep out of the way of temptation, and concluded by saying that although there were a large number of Temperance Societies, he thought the Church ought to be the largest in the world. There will be regular prayer-meetings, open to all who may wish to attend, every Tuesday and Thursday evenings.
