Everyone believes, or at least says, that justice should be tempered with mercy, but surely this does not mean that the law should be treated as a nullity, or become the hope and safety of the evil-doer. Yet if the late riot in Cincinnati teaches anything, it is that in the United States the arm of the law is growing stronger for the criminal, and weaker and weaker for the righteous. One, Berner, is proved beyond all doubt to have committed murder; a maudlin, corrupt jury, however, finds him guilty of the less heinous crime of manslaughter. Then follows the indignant but just reprimand of the judge, and to this reprimand the outraged citizens attempted to give force by doing what the law most wickedly refused to do. Such proceedings are always attended with the greatest danger, and that danger was not absent in this case. The meeting speedily became a wild and intractable mob; the scum of the city and its environs hastened thither like vultures to the prey. Socialism appeared in its most hideous form. Then ensued was about fifty killed outright, and four times as many wounded. Here is a stern and terrible warning. Liberty is good, indeed, the greatest good, but the most rigid despotism is preferable to liberty degenerated into license.

On the whole, it may safely be said that the advocates of temperance are gaining ground. Here and there, repulses. Such, however, are inseparable from the struggle. Strong verted interests, and, in an infinitely greater degree, the weakness and depravity of men, are not obstacles to be removed without the most persistent and herculean exertions. 




