The Annual Meeting of the Richmond Hill Mechanics' Institute, was held in the committee room of the Masonic Hall, on Tuesday evening, May 6th, 1884.

In the absence of the President, Mr. H. A. Nicholls, First Vice-President, took the chair.

A suggestion was received from P. G. Savage, that the doors of the engine-room be enlarged, as much difficulty is experienced in removing the engine and other fire apparatus.

Mr. Savage also gave notice that at the next meeting he would move that the members meet for practice at 8 p. m., instead of 7 p. m., as formerly. The meeting then adjourned.
