Burglary.

On Monday night, the residence of Mr. F. Kean was entered through a window, by burglars who searched his trowsers and waistcoat pockets, getting some \$10 in money, and also a gold watch worth upwards of four hundred dollars. Mr. Kean feels the loss very much, as the watch was given him by a deceased brother. The keys of his store were left on the stairs. The residence of Mr. Thos. Mulcahy was also entered, between 12 and 3.30. a. m. It is supposed an entrance was affected through the door on the south side of the building, leading from a hall between the dining-room and kitchen. The key was left in the lock on the inside, and it is presumed, by means of skeleton pliers from the outside, the thieves turned the key and unlocked the door. After passing through several rooms, they entered the bed-room of Mr. Mulcahy, took his vest off the bed-post, and his coat and trousers from a chair near the bed, into the adjoining hall, where they abstracted from his pockets a valuable gold watch, chain, and large gold locket, together with a sum of money, including a cheque for \$50, made by Messrs. Evans & Decatur, on the Dominion Bank, Orillia, dated May 12th, and payable to Mary Clarke. The thieves next passed into the sleeping department of Miss Mulcahy, and took a gold neck chain, made of American gold quarters. The manner in which they left things behind showed they were no novices at the work. He discovered that his house had been burglarised at about 3.45 a. m. It does not appear that the burglars left any clue.-Orillia Packet.



AURORA ITEMS

From Our Own Correspondent. On Monday evening, the 18th inst., a Scott Act meeting was called according to notice. It was fairly represented by voters considering the disagreeable weather on that evening. Mr. D. Fotheringham took the chair and called the meeting to order at 8 o'clock, Rev. J. E. Sanderson opened by prayer. After a few preliminary remarks by the chairman, the Rev. Mr. Robertson was called to the platform, and addressed the audience for about thirty-five minutes, in a clear and forcible manner, showing clearly that the Scott Act is in reality a Prohibitory Liquor Law, and that it can be enforced, and that it is already in force in one-fifth of the Dominion, and that over 76,000 votes have been cast on the Scott Act, of which a majority of over 22,000 is in its favor. After this the business was proceeded with, with a great deal of enthusiasm. A Committee of eight persons was appointed for Aurora. The meeting broke up at about a quarter to ten.
