Fire.

On the morning of the 24th inst., at about half past nine, a fire broke out in the Mail building, which, for a time, threatened its entire destruction. It commenced at the bottom of the elevator shaft, situated in the central portion of the building, and being fed by the well-oiled runners in which the cage works, spread with great rapidity to the other parts. A number of young ladies, employed in the telephone department, in the top flat, had a narrow escape for their life. Fatal Accident.

On the morning of the 24th inst., Harry Redditt, son of Mr. Robert Redditt, of Eversley, 3rd Con. King, was accidentally killed. He was engaged in rolling a field, and had almost completed the job, when in making a short turn with the roller, he was in some manner thrown from his seat. The roller, it would seem, passed over one arm, his chest, and partly on his head, causing instantaneous death. He was discovered very shortly afterwards by his brother, Mr. George Redditt, owner and tenant of the farm lately occupied by Mr. Gaby. The roller was still on the body; to remove it was the work of an instant, but it was too late, for although the body was still warm, life had fled. Drs. Langstaff and Wilson were at once called, but the lad was beyond human aid. Deceased was only sixteen years old. He was a bright, good-hearted boy, much liked by all who knew him. His terribly sudden death is a dreadful blow to his parents, who will have the deepest sympathy of all in their awful loss. The body was taken, on the morning of the 25th inst., to his father's house, and thence on Monday following, at two o'clock p. m., to the place of interment, the Aurora cemetery. The funeral was very largely attended. Deceased was a nephew of Messrs. B. and T. H. Redditt of this village.
