Cricket Match.

On Saturday last, a Cricket Match was played in "The Pines" near Richmond Hill Station, between the Victoria Square, and Maple Clubs, which resulted in an easy victory for the visitors. Upwards of one hundred people, a large number being ladies, assembled at the beautiful park to witness the game. It is but fair to state, that the Maple Club has been organized only for a short time, while it is well known that their opponents are "Old Stagers" on the field, and have defeated some of the best clubs in the country. VILLAGE COUNCIL.

Pursuant to notice, a Court of Revision was held in the Council Chamber, Richmond Hill, on Friday May 30th, at 2, p.m.

Mr. J. Brown, Reeve in the chair. Councilors present, Messrs. Crosby, Law, Moodie, and Hopper. The members, having subscribed to the oath, proceeded to business. The Clerk produced the Assessment Roll, together with an appeal from Mr. A. L. Skeels on behalf of Richmond Lodge, against the assessment of Masonic Hall, on the ground that said property is rented to the School Board, with the understanding that the Board pay all taxes. After some discussion on the subject, it was moved by Mr. Crosby and seconded by Mr. Moodie, that the Clerk be instructed to write to the Education Department, and ascertain whether the Hall, on account of its being occupied as a school, is exempt from taxation.

Carried. The Court then adjourned till Monday June 9th at 8.30 p.m.

After the adjournment of the Court of Revision, the Council formed for general business. The minutes of last meeting, May 12th, were read and approved.

The following accounts were read: F. Cook, work done on bridge on Dufferin Street \$2.75; Cane and sons, lumber for sidewalks \$96.93.

On motion of Mr. Law, seconded by Mr. Hopper, the above bills were ordered to be paid.

The Council then adjourned to meet immediately after the adjourned meeting of the Court of Revision.

MARKHAM COUNCIL.

Unionville, May 31st, 1884.

Council met at 10 a. m. Members all present. Minutes of last meeting read and confirmed.

Petitions received for and against altering the boundaries of S. S. Nos. 22 and 23; also for grants of money to improve roads on 9th and 10th Cons.

Communications from J. Ryan respecting railing on 2nd Con.; also from Col. Button respecting culverts on 11th Con.; also a legal opinion respecting unperformed statute labor.

Deputations were heard for and against making change in S. S. Nos. 22 and 23. Payment for sheep killed by dogs ordered to be paid. H. Leach, one killed and two damaged, W. P. Munroe, one killed and one damaged.

The price paid for gravel was made uniform throughout the township.

A resolution was passed asking the O. & Q. R. R. Co. to change the name of their station from Green River to Belford; another requesting the same Co. to put the road in proper state of repair as required by agreement.

Commissioners were appointed to repair bridges on the 2nd line, near Elgin Mills road.

The Council resolved itself into Court of Revision at 2 o'clock p. m.

Several names added to the roll; some changes made in assessment. The assessment of the O. & Q. R. R. reduced \$500, which was all the reductions made.

The next meeting of the Council will be held on the last Saturday in June.


