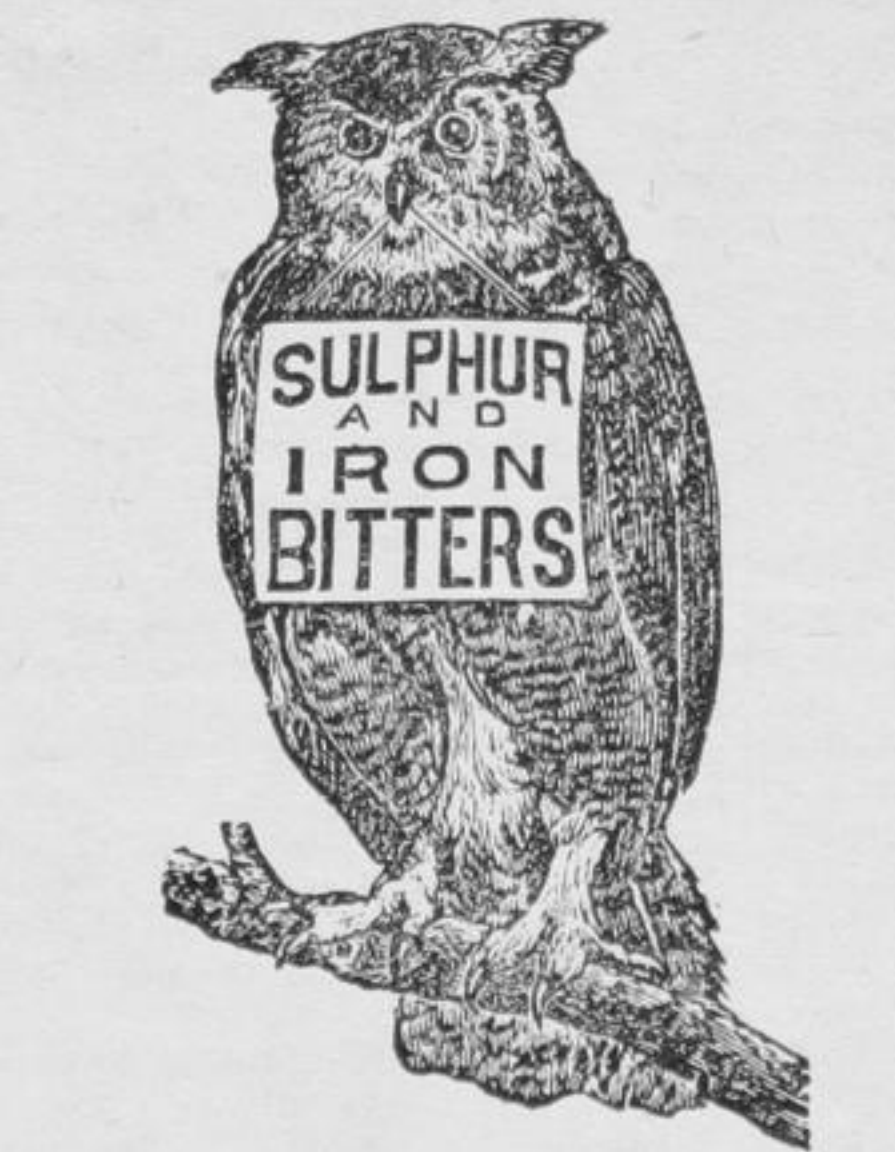
PERSONALS.
