Even in the German cantons of Switz rland diversee are more frequent than in the others. The great army of the divorced and separated is composed in very large proportion of brain workers and members of the liberal professlons. M. Bertillion's figures show that in nine cases out of ten it is the woman who desires the divorce, and that the great er the disparity in the relative ages of the parties the more frequent are the divorces Thus, where the wife is from ten to five and twenty years older than her husband, there are 480 divorces per 100,000.

ABORIGINAL RACE.

What A History of Arizona Would Unfold.

Arizona has a history which never has been written and which never will be until the mythology of the races living here is known, or until there is discovered a knowledge of the past ages which was so well hid 300 years ago that even the Spaniards visit. ing Arizona then could not obtain possession of it with all their power of forcing secret out of the people whom they conquered. Who the first inhabitants were of this far southern territory, whence they came and whither they went may, perhaps, never be known. Certainly, none to day can tell us. The past is a secret buried beneath the ages; a mystery that puzzles the learned as well as the ignorant, And yet, that the country has a history is unquestioned. There are evidences everywhere that in prehistoric times Arizona was a popular region, teeming with human activity. Long before America was thought of, before, perhaps, Athens was a reality, before the deluge, Arizona was inhabited by a race of people who have left to us only their history as it is written in their empty canals which they dug, the ruined houses which they built, the valleys which they cultivated, and in the inscribed rocks and pieces of broken pottery which are found scattered over the territory. Ages before the European saw this continent two races had lived and died in Arizona, and the existing evidences of their occupancy form one of the many attractions which the territory has to offer. Near Cosnino, on the Atlantic & Pacific Railroad for instance, there is to be seen a canon, 2,000 feet deep which is 100 yards wide at the bottom and 300 at the top. Along its walls there are great ledges of rock, which project outward from ten to twenty feet, and upon which may be traced seven tiers ot cliff dwellings. From the bottom of the lowest tier to that of the canon the distance is 200 feet, the depth apparently having formed by the action of water since the houses were built and occupied. The fronts of the dwellings and the side walls are of solid masonry, and are still well preserved. How many centuries have come and gone since these cliffs were occupied no one can tell. Thousands of years at least must have possed between the ege in which the cliff-dwellings were made and that of the advent of the European. Still another race had occupied Arizona, the people of which built the canals which are now seen in ruins about the country and who irrigated the valley now so dry and parched. Perhaps the most extensive of these ruins are those seen near the station of Ca a Grands on the Southern Pacific railroad, a short distance northwest of Tacson. Leaving the road at that station and driving or riding northward a few miles one crossas into the famous Gila river valley and to a crumbling and time-stained collection of mounds of sand and stone which are the renants of that Casa Grande, or great housewhich was first discovered by the Spaniard, more than 350 years ego. When first found the largest building was four stories high and had walls six feet in thickness.

A hundred years ago one honse still remained, which was 420 by 260 feet in size. The ruin is now but 50 by 30 feet and will soon be simply a shapeless mound. The walls are concrete, made of mud and gravel, held together by a hard cement, and the inner surface coated with cement is hard and smooth. Not far from Casa Grande there is an irrigating canal which has been followed for forty miles toward the Gila river, and which must at some time bave watered an immense tract of land which, until very lately has been deemed absolutely worth

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
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
