### Asiatic Cholera.

The press in different parts of the country is giving notes of warning to the cities and towns regarding cleanliness, owing no doubt to the fact, that a malignant type of Cholera has broken out in some of the cities of France, and is spreading rapidly. As filth furnishes the conditions most favorable for the propagation of this disease the matter of perfect cleanliness is deserving of the most serious attention of the civil authorities, not only in the large cities but also in our smallest villages. Owing to the close connection of France and England, and again between England and this Continent, it would not be surprising should cholera break out in some of our American cities at any moment.

### Resolution Carried.

At a public meeting held at Mr. D. B. Birrell's Hotel, York Mills, to devise some means to have No. 2 toll gate on Yonge St. removed farther north, it being only 3 1/2 miles from No. 1, the following resolution was carried unanimously: Moved by Mr. Geo. Wood, seconded by Mr. Geo. Duff, whereas, we the residents of the County of York, immediately in the vicinity of No. 2 toll gate, Yonge St., and travel said street less than five miles, and whereas the other gates on said road are situated five miles apart; therefore the County has dealt unjustly with us in charging us one and one half the rate of toll; therefore be it resolved that this meeting be unanimous in condemning the action of the Council in thus discriminating against us in this matter and that a petition be presented to the County Council at its next session stating those facts and asking the removal of Gate No. 2 five miles from the City limits.

### The Printers' Strike

Some of the Toronto dailies have been published this week on a much smaller scale than usual, owing to the strike among the printers in the principal city offices. The Mail has come out as a four page journal, the greater part of which is stereotype matter, procured at some of the other offices. It appears that about a year ago the compositors in the news and job offices of the city, demanded and received an advance of 10 per cent on the wages then paid them: All went well until last week when the managers of the offices gave notice to their employees that the business done no longer justified the advanced rate, and accordingly gave notice that after July 14th the wages would have to be lowered to their former level. This the men did not relish, but immediately presented an ultimatum to their employers, asking that the proposed reduction should be rescinded. Failing in this, the result was that a general strike took place, and on Sunday evening, the time for going to work for the morning papers, few men could be found at their former places. Since that time several of the job offices have come to terms with their men; but the Mail and Globe appear to be determined in fighting it through, and have judiciously avoided finding any fault with the conduct of their employees, except that they did not give notice according to the rules of the union. It is unfortunate that such means should be resorted to in a civilized country like Canada, as some satisfactory settlement could easily be adopted, if men could be taught to study the welfare of their neighbor as well as their own.
