Play was then continued until halfpast six o'clock, when J. Fogg, of the Markham club, became disabled by a fall and was obliged to cease playing. The "Stars" claimed the right to put on Dan. McCrae, to fill the vacancy, the Patterson club objected, but were willing to drop a man from their side. A dispute arose, the referee, Mr. C. Savage, was referred to, who took the view that Patterson should drop a man. The Markham team would not play under those conditions, so the match went by default in favor of Patterson.


