**Earthquake.**

McClung, Gold Medalist of the Provincial Normal School, Second Assistant, and Miss McLellan, daughter of Dr. McLellan, High School Inspector, has been transferred from the Ottawa Normal to take the position vacated by Mr. Davie.

### Methodist Church.

An interesting service will be held in the Methodist Church of this place next Sunday morning. Upwards of fifty persons will be admitted into full membership with the church, who were received on trial at the close of the special meetings last winter. Several adults will be baptised. An appropriate sermon will be preached by the pastor, Rev. W. R. Barker.

Proctor has made arrangements with the Grand Trunk and Northern to convey 200 passengers from Richmond Hill to the village.

### Second Class Certificates.

The list of successful candidates at the recent examination for 2nd Class Non-professional certificates has been published, and as usual our High School compares favorably with the other High Schools and Collegiate Institutes in the Province. We give the names of those from High Schools in the County, which shows that Richmond Hill has done much better work than her sister schools: Richmond Hill—E. Miller, A; P. E. Grant, A; J. S. Gray, B; F. McConaghy, B; J. E. Tyndall, B. Newmarket—W. Lloyd, B; H. E. Lewis, B. Weston—J. B. Kaiser, A. There may be others whose names do not appear in the present list, as these wrote only for 2nd Class certificates, whereas several others presented themselves for Second and Third Class, and the examiners have not concluded their work.

### Serious Accident.

A very serious accident occurred on the lacrosse grounds on Friday evening last. Mr. Jas Gregg of Patterson was watching the game as the club were practising, and one of the players accidentally ran against him with tremendous force, knocking him down and breaking his leg below the knee. The accident in all probability would not have happened had it not been that Mr. Gregg had just taken his little boy in his arms to shield him from danger. Dr. Wilson was immediately sent for and arrived in a short time and set the limb. Those who witnessed the occurrence and saw the filial affection of the child towards his father speak of it as one of the most touching scenes of their life. The sufferer was conveyed in a carriage to his home and from last accounts is doing well, although he has suffered considerably from pains in the back.

### Public Meeting.

In answer to a requisition signed by a large number of rate-payers, a meeting was called by the Reeve on Tuesday evening last, to take into consideration the advisability of a park for the village. On motion, Mr. Brown took the chair, and Mr. M. H. Keefer acted as secretary. The chairman briefly stated the object of the meeting and said he would be in favor of the village buying the park rather than a joint stock company. The question was then thrown open for discussion. In regard to the size of the lot, Mr. McConaghy thought 5 acres would be suitable. Mr. Harrison was in favor of a park, and thought the Davidson Estate consisting of 8 1/2 acres would be satisfactory. It could be purchased for less than \$600. Mr. J. Palmer considered the Davidson property far too small, and spoke of 17 acres on Centre St., which could be bought for \$100 an acre; he thought this would be a good investment. The following resolutions were carried unanimously:—Moved by J. M. Lawrence, seconded by P. G. Savage, that in the opinion of this meeting a Public Park is desirable for Richmond Hill, if the same can be obtained at a reasonable price and in a suitable location.—Carried. Moved by Mr. McConaghy, seconded by Mr. Redditt, that Messrs. Lawrence, Savage, Pugsley, Brown and Skeele be a committee to ascertain upon what terms a suitable lot could be obtained and report to a meeting this night's week.—Carried.
