AURORA.

For some time Methodist Union has been the principal subject for conversation and debate among that people in Aurora. A brief statement of affairs will, no doubt, be of deep interest to the Methodist cenders of THE LIBERAL.

Three churches of that sect have existed in this village. At the last Conference it was wisely decided to dispose of one and keep the other two. The question arose as to whether the late Primitive or Episcopal should be closed. The former is a plain, substantial buildwith a large yard and ample shed room; has a membership of nearly 100 and a good audience and choir besides; is free from debt and after paying the quarterage, &c , has money on hand. The other is about the same size, presents a finer appearance, with a small yard and insufficient sheds; has a membership of abour 20, and a debt of \$200; a very small andience and no choir.

After a series of meetings of the two congregations, wire-pulling commenced, and the breach became wider. At last it was decided to refer the matter to the District Committee appointed by Conference. The committee met the trustees of each church, heard their claims and decided to close the P. M. Church, in direct opposition to the wishes of a large majority of the parties concerned. The consequence is that the congregation is scattered. Some will remain loyal to Methodism, others go to other churches, while some to no church at all.
