Council Meeting.

Pursuant to adjournment the Council met on Wednesday evening, Sept. 3rd. In the absence of the Reeve, Mr. Crosby was called to the chair. Other members present, Messrs. Moodie, Hopper and Law. Minutes of Aug. 6th were read and adopted. A bill from M. H. Keefler was ordered to be paid. A list of members of the Fire Brigade was presented to the Council to be certified by the fire and water committee as being regular firemen. The names were accordingly certified to. A petition was read, which was signed by Mr. J. M. Lawrence and 47 other property holders, asking the Council to pass a By-Law to enable the village to purchase a lot of land from Dr. Langstaff, on the north side of Centre St., for a Public Park. The Council expressed a willingness to grant the request of the above petition, but thought it would be more advisable to call a public meeting of the rate-payers of the village with a view of obtaining their consent to apply a portion of the distribution fund for the purchase of land for said park, and a resolution was passed to that effect. It was then moved by Mr. Law, seconded by Mr. Moodie, that a public meeting be called on Wednesday, Sept. 10th, '84, at 7:30 p. m., in accordance with the above resolution. Council then adjourned.
