The Scott Act Sustained.

The voting on the Scott Act Repeal in Halton, took place on Tuesday, and the returns show that the Act has been sustained by a majority of about 120 votes. The supporters of Temperance have good reason to be elated over their success. In 1881, the Act in that county was carried by a majority of 81 and after a trial of three years the majority has been considerably increased. The result shows that the people in Halton are in favor of the Act as the county was thoroughly organized, and the liquor interest put their best forces forward and spent a large amount of money in the contest. This result will prove a stimulus to the other counties which have decided to submit the Act.

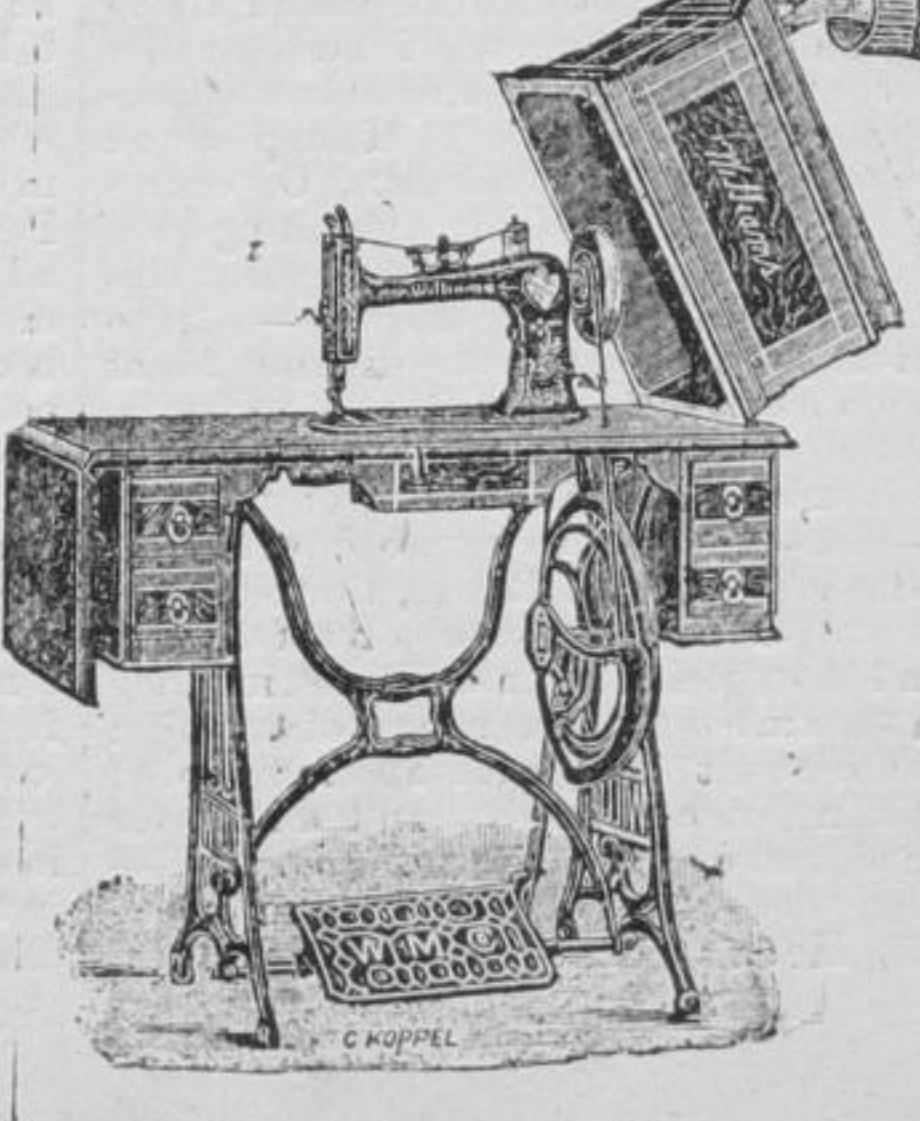
