The general opinion is, of course, that the guilty parties should be watched, arrested and made an example of, but there is a certain amount of odium attached to the prosecution of a boy by a citizen, and few are prepared to throw down the gauntlet. The perpetrators of such mean dishonesty, we believe, are narrowed down to a few, who have been long enough at the business to be more than suspected. We would suggest a Vigilance Committee to ferret out the guilty parties, or that the Council should offer a reward for information that would lead to the arrest of these garden thieves and deter others from similar depredations.

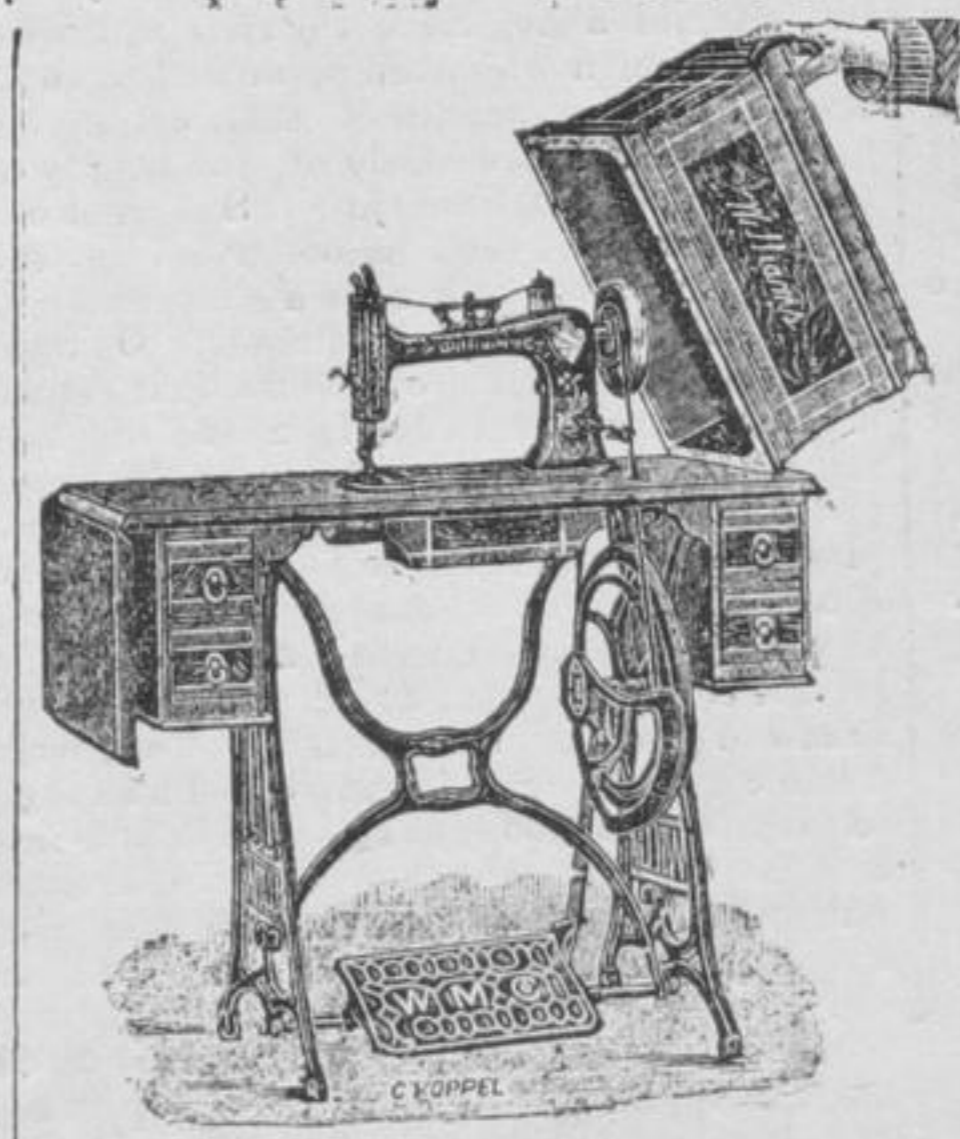
