Educational Changes.

The recently published regulations in regard to the examination for teachers' certificates have been modified as follows: For Thirds the bonus for Music is increased to 75, and a bonus of 72 for Botany, or of 150 for Latin or French or German will also be allowed; For Seconds, a bonus for Botany or for Languages will be allowed the same as Thirds, or candidates may substitute one of three languages for Chemistry, Statics and Hydrostatics. The Botany for both classes will be the same as at last examination.
