The fall session of the County Council opened on Tuesday last. There was a good attendance of members at the opening. Several notices of motion were made on the first day, among which were the following: By Mr. McClure—That a committee be appointed to investigate the matters of expense in the Industrial Home; By Mr. Turner—That all the toll-gates in the County be removed as soon as possible; By Mr. Jackson—That in the opinion of this Council, the school law be amended so as to provide for the election of school trustees by ballot.

The Markham Council met at Unionville, on Saturday, November 12th, at 10 a. m. The members were all present. The minutes of last meeting were read and confirmed. Messrs Bruce, Reesor, and Lundy appointed commissioners for repairing various bridges and culverts. A By-law, appointing returning officers for the Municipal Election of 1885, was passed. The Council adjourned to meet on Dec. 20th.

Moved by Mr. Crosby, seconded by Mr. Hopper, that the Reeve be instructed to offer a reward of \$5.00 for the conviction of parties injuring property in the village belonging to rate-payers.—Carried. The Council adjourned to meet on Wednesday, 17th Dec., 1884, at 8.30 sharp.

Davis, Warden of the County of York, gave a banquet to the members of the County Council, and a large number of invited guests from the city of Toronto and surrounding country, at the Albion Hotel, on Tuesday evening last. East York; Dr. Widdfield, M. P. North York; Major Gray, M. P. West York. The Warden in his opening remarks expressed a hope that the meeting be not only one of pleasure, but of profit, and the whole proceedings went to show his wish was fully realized.
