LOCALS

Jubilee Singers.
The Jubilee Singers of Pisk University gave their concert last evening in the Methodist Church to a fair house. However much the audience may have anticipated, we feel certain their anticipations were fully realized. The programme was opened by the company singing that beautiful melody, "Steal away to Jesus," which was worthy of the highest possible praise. A bass solo by Mr. J. N. Caldwell was listened to with the closest attention and interest. But perhaps the grandest and most pathetic piece during the evening was given by Miss Jennie Jackson entitled, "I am travelling to the grave." As far as we are able to judge it was the most beautiful piece we ever had the pleasure of listening to. Most of the melodies contain some expression of sadness, yet some, as the part song "Jingle Bells," are very lively. It would seem presumptuous on our part to attempt a criticism on anything so genuine in expression, and will only say that the selections by the whole company were rendered in the most perfect style, the voices blending in the sweetest harmony and producing the most pleasing effect on the hearers. Had the singers among them a spokesman who could introduce the pieces, narrate incidents of plantation life, and make general remarks at intervals, the programme would be somewhat lengthened and would become even more enjoyable.

Reunion.
The first Reunion of the season given by the Directors of the Mechanics' Institute was held in the Masonic Hall on Friday evening last. Owing, no doubt, to the night being wet and dark, the roads being in a very muddy condition, and the Jubilee Concert being so close at hand, the audience was not so large as could have been desired. Although some, whose names were on the posters, did not put in an appearance, a good programme was well carried out by those who took part. The President, Mr. J. A. E. Switzer, opened the Reunion by a few appropriate remarks, after which Messrs. Sanderson, Storey & Atkinson sang a trio in good style. Miss Bertha Wilson gave a couple of her popular recitations during the evening, which brought forth much applause. She presents an agreeable appearance on the platform, and creates a good impression on her hearers. Her voice is clear and full, her gestures easy and graceful, and she possesses in many respects, the qualities requisite for an accomplished elocutionist. Perhaps an exact critic might say that too much enthusiasm is thrown into the beginning of the selection, scarcely leaving sufficient limit for the spirit of the piece to increase to the end. Mr. J. G. Bailey and daughter gave a couple of instrumental pieces on the violin and piano. Master Willie and Florence Bailey danced beautifully in costume, the "Highland Fling," and were loudly encored. The children kept the best of time with the music, and, judging from the happy countenances of those present, any prejudice existing against this harmless amusement was, for the time dispelled. Miss Iva Wells, of King, favored the audience with two songs, which were well received. Mr. A. J. Hume sang with much acceptance "An Irishman's Toast." Mrs. G. Wiley, Miss Crnickshank and Mr. T. H. Redditt gave appropriate readings, the two latter appearing for the first time before a Richmond Hill audience. Mr. D. McKay read a selection from Dickens and produced much laughter. Mrs. Switzer and Miss Nicholls presided at the piano. The programme was brought to a close by a laughable farce entitled "the lunatic," in which Messrs. W. A. Sanderson, S. Agar and L. Bailey took part, each one sustaining well his reputation as an actor. The audience dispersed after singing the National Anthem.

TEMPERANCE ITEMS

Supplied by the I. O. G. T. Lodge, Richmond Hill.

Sir Richard Temple recently lectured in Winnipeg on the North-West, and in speaking of the Prohibitory Liquor Law in force there, said: "He had to congratulate the people of this country upon the manner in which the manufacture and sale of intoxicating liquor had been curtailed and kept down in the territory. He had been informed that the prohibitory liquor law had been enforced in the North-West territory out of humane consideration for the poor Indian. It was equally advantageous for the white men of the territory. He would urge the people of this country, as they had inaugurated such a good system of sobriety, for God's sake to retain it. England could testify her bitter experience, in the matter of drinking liquor."

The Seminole Indians cannot understand the white man's method of dealing with fire water. They say, "He first licenses a man to distil it, then a man to sell it, then he pays a policeman to catch those who drink it and take them to jail, and when they come out they drink and are put in again. Don't understand it." Ex.

The number of persons officially reported in the asylums of the State of Maine and of this Province is given as follows for the last ten years: In Maine asylums, 4,703, in Ontario asylums, 18,214. The population of Ontario is about three times as great as Maine, while the insane population is considerably greater.

Ontario has thirty-eight Counties and unions of Counties, and ten cities, of which nine counties have adopted the Scott Act, and in eighteen counties and seven cities agitation has been started in its favor.

Dec. 9th, 1884.

Board met in the High School. President in the chair.

Members present; Messrs. Trench, Naughton, Patterson, Savage, Switzer, Boyle, Skeele, McConaghy, and Duncan.

Minutes of last meeting read and on motion adopted.

Moved by Mr. McConaghy, seconded by Mr. Savage, that the account of Wm. Atkinson be paid.—Carried.

Moved by Mr. Trench, seconded by Mr. Naughton, that Mr. John Sanderson be appointed Returning Officer for the election of Trustees to fill vacancies.—Carried.

The report of the Managing Committee on stoves for Public Schools was concurred in.

Moved by Mr. Duncan, seconded by Mr. Boyle, that the petition of rate-payers for changing wood stoves in Public Schools to coal stoves, be left in the hands of the Committee of Management.

Amendment by Mr. Trench, seconded by Mr. Naughton, that the Committee of Management be instructed to take out wood stoves and replace them with coal stoves.

The amendment was lost.

Moved by Mr. Savage, seconded by Mr. Naughton, that no advance be made to Miss Spragge's salary for 1885.—Carried.

Moved by Mr. Duncan, seconded by Mr. Trench, that no advance be made to Miss Rutherford's salary for 1885.—Carried.

Moved by Mr. McConaghy, seconded by Mr. Naughton, that the premium of insurance on the High School building, 30.00 be paid to the Western Insurance Co.

The meeting then adjourned, to meet at the call of the chair.
