Village Council.

The Council met on Tuesday evening, 30th Dec., 1884. Reeve in the chair, Councillors present, Messrs. Crosby, Moodie, Hopper and Law. Minutes of last meeting read and approved. The Clerk informed the Council that Mr. Daniels, tax collector, had returned his roll with all the taxes collected, with the exception of two small items, and they could not be levied, the premises being unoccupied. Moved by Mr. Crosby, seconded by Mr. Hopper, that the tax collector's bonds be cancelled and the Treasurer is hereby instructed to hand the same over to Mr. Jas. Daniels.—Carried. Moved by Mr. Moodie, seconded by Mr. Hopper, that the Treasurer is hereby authorized to refund \$1 dog tax to Mr. Thomas Wilson.—Carried. The petition of W. J. Wilson, M. D., and 59 others praying the Council to pass a stringent By-Law regulating billiard table keepers, was read. Moved by Mr. Moodie, seconded by Mr. Law, that the Billiard By-Law be laid over until Tuesday evening next, Jan. 6th.—Carried. The following bills were presented and ordered to be paid: The Reeve, for tramps, \$5.25; Jos Hall, for nails, 80c; Levi Gaby, plowing park, 6 1/2 days work at \$3, \$19.50. The Council then adjourned to Jan 5th, 1885.
