Scott Act Petitions.

Petitions are being circulated by the opponents of the Scott Act, praying for an alteration in the law, so as to require the polling of a three-fifths majority vote in favor of the Act before it can be brought into operation. To counteract this, at a meeting of the Executive committee of the Dominion Alliance it was unanimously resolved to issue counter petitions, asking that no change may be made in the Scott Act that would make it less effective, or that would make it more difficult to secure its adoption or enforcement. It was also resolved to embody in the same prayer a petition for the total prohibition of the liquor traffic.

N. Y. Teachers' Association.

The Regular half-yearly meeting of the above Association will be held at the Model School in the Town of Newmarket, on Thursday and Friday, January 22nd and 23rd, commencing each day at 10 a. m. Arrangements have been made to secure the cooperation of all classes of temperance workers, and discussions upon the different questions connected with the prohibitory movement will be initiated by prominent gentlemen of ability and experience, among whom are the following:—W. B. Geikie, M. D.; J. J. McLaren, M. A.; W. H. Howland, Esq.; Wm. Houston, M. A.; W. H. Young, Esq., Police Magistrate, Halton County; Prof. G. E. Foster, M. P. On the evening of the first day a complimentary supper will be given to the members and delegates from a distance, and addresses will be delivered by the President, Hon. S. H. Blake, Q. C. and other prominent citizens and visitors. On the evening of the second day there will be held a Mass Meeting in St. Andrew's Hall to be addressed by delegates, and on Thursday evening, there will be a grand campaign meeting addressed by some of the ablest speakers of the day. All the sessions of the convention will be open to the public, but only members and delegates will be expected to take part in the discussions and voting. The public are cordially invited to attend.
