 Thousands upon thousands of people from all parts of the continent are going to the Montreal Carnival at the end of January. North York Teachers' Convention.
 The half-yearly Convention of the North York Teachers was held in the Model School, Newmarket, on Thursday and Friday, 23rd and 24th inst. Notwithstanding the severity of the weather, which was the coldest of the season, the attendance was larger than at any previous meeting of the Association. The roll call on Thursday morning was responded to by about fifty-five teachers, which number was increased to seventy as the day advanced. Much disappointment was felt at the absence of Dr. McLellan, who, on account of illness, was prevented from being present. Our worthy Inspector, however, aided by the teachers present, put forth commendable effort to fill the vacancy, caused by the Dr's absence, and succeeded in making the Convention a decided success. Mr. Rennie took up the subject of Composition on Thursday morning, and furnished the teachers with some very useful hints on the teaching of the same. Miss Sprague presented a very interesting and instructive paper on Geography taught to a third class, which brought on a very animated discussion on the subject. The Uniform Promotion Programme was next discussed, and some of the subjects received considerable modification, and perhaps improvement. The evening session partook partly of the nature of an entertainment. The principal feature being the discussion of "Township Boards, vs. present system," which was very ably led by the Inspector in favor of the former. Readings, short speeches, &c., filled in the remaining portion of the evening. On Friday morning considerable time was spent in discussing the different school periodicals, which had been submitted for the approval of the teachers. The *Educational Weekly*, a new paper edited by Mr. Bryant, formerly of Galt Col. Inst., was generally preferred. The interests of the *Weekly* were looked after by Mr. Frazer, and those of the *Canada School Journal* by Mr. Kennedy. The last session was taken up with election of officers for the present year, arranging programme for next meeting and other business matters. We have given a very brief notice of the proceedings, went of space rendering it impossible to do more. We will at some future time refer to the Library and other commendable features of the North York Teachers' Association.
