Accidental Poisoning.
 An accident of a very serious nature occurred at Maple on Tuesday. Mr. Thomas Keys, an old and faithful servant, who had been in the employ of Dr. Orr for a number of years past, went into the Dr's laboratory at about 7 a. m., and took a draught from a bottle of what he supposed to be intoxicating liquor, but what unfortunately turned out to be Acetone, a very poisonous drug. Feeling the effects immediately afterwards, the Dr. was summoned, who, without delay, sent for Dr. Wilson, but nothing could be done to save the distressed victim from his untimely death. He lived but a few hours.

The Village Park.
 In response to a numerous signed petition of rate-payers, the Village Council has decided on selling the park lot purchased some months ago and buying another, better suited to the wants of the village. As yet no site has been definitely fixed upon, but several liberal offers have been received, from which we hope they will make a good choice. To select a lot satisfactory to all parties will be an utter impossibility, but we trust the greatest care will be exercised in the selection. The agitators of the change are to be congratulated on getting rid of what was formerly known as "Thistle Park."

Entrance Exam. Regulations.
 The High School entrance regulations have recently been revised by the Education Department, with a view to secure increased efficiency on the part of both Public and High Schools. The following is a synopsis of the changes:—The subjects of examination remain as before, but the details under some of the heads have been altered. In writing a special paper will be set of a practical nature, and marks will be assigned on most of the other papers for writing and neatness. In drawing, half the marks assigned to the subject may be awarded as the result of the examiners' inspection of the candidates drawing-book. Next July the examination on history will be confined, as hitherto, to the outlines of English history. In subsequent examinations the outlines of Canadian history are prescribed, in addition to English history, and candidates will be expected to have a general knowledge of how England, Canada and Ontario are governed. In reading, a general knowledge will be required of vocal expression, with special reference to emphasis, inflection and pause. Of the marks assigned for composition, a maximum of about one-third may be awarded on the papers in history and English Literature. As before, one-third of the maximum of the marks on each paper is also required.
