The chair was ably filled by Miss Ada Reid, who, on opening the concert, thanked the audience for their attendance, and, in a pleasing speech, assured those present that she would not follow the example of bachelors, who generally said they did not come prepared to make a speech, and then torture the audience by giving about an hour and a half as an introduction. The spinsters gave the introductory piece entitled "Poor Old Maids," and judging from the playful smile on their countenances, many of them had not yet despaired. Two little girls, the Misses Wilson, gave an instrumental duet on the piano which was well performed. One of the nicest performances of the evening was a vocal duet by Miss Reid and Mr. Gorry. Miss Purkiss, of Toronto, sang with much acceptance, "Ehren on the Rhine." Miss Bricker, late of Winnipeg, sang "Who will Buy my Roses, &c.," and being encored, gave "I wouldn't, would you?" Miss Bricker also appeared in the second part of the programme, and although responding with an encore, the audience did not yet appear to be satisfied, so charming were her singing and amiable appearance. The orchestra from Toronto was such a treat as is seldom looked for outside of large cities. Mr. Gorry delighted the audience with his comic songs, and ludicrous gestures. Mr. Simms recited a couple of pieces which scarcely harmonized with the rest of the concert. Miss Collins sang a song which was well received. Owing to the lateness of the hour the Art Gallery was dispensed with, but which will be shown on Monday evening next, when a new programme will be arranged.
