On Monday last, Mr. Hodgson, senior Inspector of High Schools, paid our High School a visit. He spent some five or six hours in examining, or hearing examined, the various classes. #### The Rebellion.

The news from the North-West still continues ominous. Since the first battle with the Half-breeds in which 12 loyalists were killed, 4 more murders have been substantiated. The Indians are said to be in open revolt in many places, and it is feared the trouble is just commencing. It is said the number of rebels killed in the first engagement was 47. Fort Carleton has been evacuated, and fired by Colonel Irvine, who for better safety retired to Prince Albert. The report that Battleford has been taken by the Indians is not substantiated, but the citizens are in constant peril of an attack. A large number of the Queen's Own, Grenadiers, &c., left Toronto on Monday for the scene of action, amid tears of mingled joy and grief from thousands of relatives and friends. The 12th Battalion, York Rangers, have received orders and are expected to follow those already gone.

#### Village Council.

A special meeting of the Village Council was held in the Council Chamber, on Thursday evening, March 26th, the Mayor in the chair. Members present, Messrs. Redditt, McConaghy, Savage and Powell. Minutes of last meeting read and adopted. An account from T. F. McMahon, amounting to \$9.00, for printing and folding 200 Village Accounts was read. On motion of Mr. Savage, seconded by Mr. McConaghy, the account was ordered to be paid. The Clerk read the agreement signed by Mr. John Palmer, in reference to change of land for Village Park, which report was adopted by the Council. By-Law No. 110, relating to change of Park was read a first, second and third time and passed, and seal of the corporation was attached thereto. On motion, Mr. Teevy was authorized to do the necessary conveyancing in reference to deed for park, and to have the 4 1/2 acres properly surveyed by a land surveyor. Mr. A. J. Rupert was appointed a member of the Board of Health, in place of J. K. Falconbridge, refused. The Council adjourned till Monday, April 20th, next.

#### Fire.

An about 9.30 p. m. on Monday, just as many of our citizens were retiring for the night, an alarm of fire was sounded, and, on turning out, it was ascertained that a dwelling house owned and occupied by Mr. Jesse Goode was already enveloped in flames. The house being situated at the west side of Wilson's mill pond, and more than half a mile from the Fire Hall, was almost burned to the ground before the engine could be got to the place. The fire originated from the stovepipes which ignited the roof of the house, and as the family lived in the lower part, they did not perceive the danger they were in for some time. One of the sons, a young man 21 years of age, who has been laid up with rheumatic fever for several months, was removed with much difficulty to a neighbor's house, and being in a weak state, fainted away several times in the excitement. A good deal of the furniture, house utensils, clothing, &c., was saved, but as is the case at nearly all fires, much was broken and destroyed by the carelessness and thoughtlessness of those who were eager to assist. Among much valuable property which was burnt was an elegant piano. Firemen and non-firemen worked hard and did all they could for the homeless family. Fortunately, the building and contents were pretty well insured.
