According to resolution the Council met on Friday, 24th inst., for the purpose of inspecting streets and sidewalks. Messrs. H. A. Nicholls and T. F. McMahon, as members of a committee appointed by the Fire Brigade, addressed the Council, asking that the captain or officer in command be allowed the privilege of ordering refreshments for those who may assist in extinguishing a fire, and that the cost be paid out of the funds of the Municipality. The suggestion was approved by the Council.

The Council adjourned to meet on Monday evening, May 17th.
