RICHMOND HILL

A Successful Day.

Few places of any importance could be named within the borders of the British Empire, whose inhabitants did not celebrate in some form or another on Monday last, the 67th birthday of our beloved sovereign. Throughout the length and breadth of our land the ordinary labor was suspended, and young and old, rich and poor, of all classes and creeds, went

in for a full day's amusement. Richmond Hill, as usual, donned her best attire, and was actively engaged from early morning till late at night. The crowd was not as large as on some former occasions, owing to the gloomy and unsettled appearance of the sky in the morning, which, no doubt, kept many hundreds of people away who would otherwise have attended. The cornet band enlivened the proceedings of the day, and never failed to draw a throng whenever it struck up "God Save the Queen," or some other familiar air. The Richmond Hill and Yonge Street Agricultural Society held its

ELEVENTH ANNUAL SPRING EXHIBITION,

and, notwithstanding the threatening weather, was a success, although the receipts at the gate fell short of last year. The entries also were noticeably smaller in several of the classes, particularly in the horses although the animals shown were of a superior class. Owners of horses from a distance would not risk coming on account of the muddy state of the roads, which would place at a disadvantage the showing of the animals, especially the heavy breeds. Mr. J. Palmer showed his heavy draught stallions and succeeded in taking prizes. Mr. Bell's horse," Duke of Cambridge" took second in this class. He is a fine looking horse, and makes a good exhibition in the ring. Mr. Jonathan Brillinger took first prize with his Canadian draught stallion, and

Mr. Geo. Smith, of Whitchurch, second. In the show of cattle was noticeable a fine display of Jerseys shown by Mr. Cherry. This is a profitable kind of cattle to raise. We heard the owner say that he made seven pounds of butter in three days from one of the cows of this herd when not a year and a half old. In sheep, Messrs. R. Marsh and G. Weldrick carried off the bulk of the prizes, the former showing Southdowns, Cotswolds and Leicesters. Some of the sheep exhibited by Mr. Marsh had taken first prize at the New Orleans Exposition this Spring. In swine, the principal exhibittry were W. and A. Wright of this place. In implements, the firm of Patterson & Bro., of Patterson, Massey & Co., Toronto, Harris & Son, of Brantford, the Fleury Estate, Aurora, and Abell, of Woodbridge, were well represented. The competition among the first four named firms for self-binders was very keen, and the machines were made to do excellent work. Abell showed a threshing machine and engine. T. Wilson succeeded in carrying off the prize for Fanning Mills. He has a mill now that will clean perfectly all kinds of grain, Timothy and Clover seed &c. H. Miller exhibited several fine

pumps which did good work. One of the most pleasing sights on the grounds was the carriage display of A. Wright & Son, of Richmond Hill, which far surpassed anything of the kind ever exhibited here, for style, finish and workmanship. The exhibit was as follows: one Gent's English Cart to carry four, one New Haven Cart to carry four, one Ladies' Cart to carry two, one covered phaeton, one Ladies' Covered phaeton, one Covered Buggy, one Surrey, one twoseated Covered Carriage, one covered Corning Buggy, and one Gent's Speeding Waggon, These carriages were the attraction of the public. We were informed this firm made several sales on that day, and received many orders for work to be manufactured. Mr. J. Cruickshank of the Weston Carriage works, showed a Detachable Spring Waggon which should

supercede anything previously invented. The work in the Ladies' Department was far superior to that of any previous year, in fact, such an elegant display is seldom seen at any of the County shows. The judging in this department was very arduous, owing to the large number of entries, and to the inconvenience of the building in which the articles were placed. The judges were Mrs F. Mason, Mrs. M. Boyle, and Miss Page, and too much credit cannot be given those ladies who spent many hours in the faithful discharge of their duties. Mrs. Smyth, Miss McVean, Miss Eyer, Mrs. W. Proctor and miss Rowden were among those who displayed excellent taste in their fancy work.
