LACROSSE MATCH.

Brampton vs. Richmond Hill
Young Canadians victorious

The Lacrosse Match played here last Saturday, for the medal and the Western District Championship, was a very exciting one, and the result shows that the long chain of victories by the "Young Canadians" is still unbroken. Although playing against one of the foremost clubs in the province, the home team scored three straight games with the greatest ease in fifteen, thirty-five, and nine minutes. The honors for putting the ball through the goals were divided, Savage ending the first, A. Pugsley the second, and Piper, the third game.

The clouds were heavy all during the forenoon and threatened rain, notwithstanding which, people came in from all quarters, and, although the rain was pouring down at three o'clock when play commenced, the grand stand was packed with ladies, and the fences surrounding the grounds were literally covered with the male sex. The Richmond Hill Cornet Band was present, and enlivened the intervals with selections of music. Although the visitors had the advantage in weight, when they were met by other two finer looking clubs never appeared on our lacrosse grounds, the white shirts of the "Young Canadians" presenting a marked contrast with the dark blue of the "Excelsiors." Obituary.
His end was peace,
He has entered into his rest.
Dick—in Richmond Hill, on Monday, June 1st,
the Rev. Jas. Dick, senior Pastor of the Pres-
byterian Churches of Richmond Hill and
Thornhill, in the 77th year of his age.

The subject of this notice was born in Drumbane, Ayrshire, in Scotland, and was educated at the Glasgow University, and having entered the ministry early in life he preached with acceptance first in Scotland, and afterwards in the North of England. But upon his father and the rest of the family moving to Canada, he also concluded to cast his lot in this country. The first charge that he held in this Province was in the Township of Emily,

in the County of Peterborough. But in the year 1849 he received a unanimous call from the Presbyterian Church of this place and that of Thornhill to become their pastor, and trusting in the strength and assistance of his Divine Master he accepted the charge. Of the success of his labors since that time, the large and flourishing congregations in Laskay and Temperanceville in the Township of King, which were formed through his exertions, and which grew so rapidly that they soon became a separate charge, and also the increased membership in the church here and Thornhill, abundantly testify.

And although of a modest, unassuming nature yet he was ever ready with a kind and reasonable word of warning to those that were in danger of going astray; and of encouragement to the anxious enquirer on his way heavenward, always appealing to the Law and Testimony as proof of his statements. And although through the infirmities of age he was compelled in the year 1877 to give up the more active work of the ministry, yet his zeal in the great work of winning souls for Christ did not abate, for when strength permitted he was always to be found at the prayer meeting and by the bed of sickness, and as a teacher in the Bible Class, his superior was hard to find. By a strictly christian walk and conduct he was enabled to obtain the esteem of all who knew him, and ministers and members of other denominations considered it an honor to be acquainted with him.

He leaves behind him a sorrowing wife, who has been the partner of his joys and sorrows for many years, and one son, Mr. John Dick, of Listowell, and one daughter, the wife of Mr. Robert McKean of Port Dover. They were all with him at the time of his decease. They mourn, but not as those who mourn without hope. The earthly tabernacle—his body—remains with us; we place it in the grave where it will mix with kindred dust, and rest until the last trumpet shall sound, when the dead in Christ shall arise first. But that living principal—his immortal

soul—is now clothed in the white robes of Christ's Righteousness, and in the presence of the great Triune Jehovah is enjoying the reward of the faithful.—Com.
