The Council decided that as the appeal was too late, it would not be advisable to make a change in the assessment. The Council granted the Clerk an I. Treas. a week's leave of absence. Council adjourned to meet on Monday, July 13th, at 8.30 p. m. M. TEEFY, Clerk.
