Lacrosse Match.

Saturday, June 20th, 1885, will long be remembered by lovers of our National game, as a red-letter day in Richmond Hill. From the time it was made certain that the "Young Canadians" were to face a strong team from the Toronto club, the greatest interest was manifested, and few there were who would venture to give a decided opinion regarding the result of the match. The sky threatened rain during the afternoon, notwithstanding which, the largest crowd ever known to witness a lacrosse match here assembled, and anxiously waited for the play to commence. Fully one thousand people were on the grounds. The grand stand, which had been enlarged to twice its former capacity, was packed, principally by the fair sex, who seemed to take as deep an interest in the play throughout as did the men.

Judging from appearance there was very little difference in the weight of the teams. The Toronto's were neatly dressed in blue shirts and black pants, whilst the Hill boys wore, as usual, their black pants and white shirts. Mr. F. W. Carvin was field captain for the Torontos, and Mr. M. Wilson acted in a similar capacity for the Young Canadians. Mr. A. G. F. Lawrence was referee, and the umpires were Messrs. Garvin and H. A. Nichols.

The ball was faced at 10 minutes to 4. Each game was exceedingly well contested, though from the beginning of the match to the close it was plainly seen that the advantage was on the side of the home team.

The first game lasted only 4 minutes, and was brought to a close by Searle sending the ball between the Toronto flags.

After a few minutes rest, the ball was again faced, and this game, which was the best of the day, lasted for 35 minutes. During this time the rubber was three-fourths of the time around the Toronto goal, and very dangerous shots were fired by Searle, Pagsley and Savage, but the dexterity and watchful eye of W. Rundle, the goal-keeper, proved too much for them in this game, and after some fine team play by the visitors, they worked the rubber through, and the second game was theirs.

The third game lasted 16 minutes, when Powell getting hold of the rubber made a brilliant throw, and scored another game for the home team.

The fourth and last was the shortest played, lasting less than 2 minutes. Savage put it through this time and brought the match to a close.

After the usual cheer for both teams, they marched from the grounds, headed by the Cornet Band, and were afterwards dined at the Grand Central hotel.

The play was magnificent on both sides. Of the Torontos, Conlon, Bunde and McDonald acquitted themselves with great distinction. The last named has frequently played with the first twelve, and by the way he handled his crosse on Saturday we would consider him well worthy of the honor. Of the home team we will not particularize, as with one or two exceptions, each man filled his place admirably, and by their united efforts came off victors, and had the proud honor of defeating a team which seldom crosses sticks with clubs outside of large cities. In the evening the opposing teams were banquetted in the Temperance Hall by the ladies of the village. Interesting speeches bearing on the day's amusement, and lacrosse in general, were given by Messrs. T. Redditt, F. W. Garvin, A. G. F. Lawrence and J. A. McDonald.

The day passed by without a jar of any kind, and the Torontos, although defeated, went home perfectly satisfied with their trip.
