

Toronto's Fire.

A special meeting of the Richmond Hill Fire Brigade was held in the Council Chamber on Saturday evening, Aug. 1st. There were over thirty members pres

Messrs. C. Trevethan, G. Kidd, C. E. Sheppard and F. McConaghy, jr., were proposed and accepted as firemen.

The Lieutenant then stated that the meeting was in reference to a communi-cation from Buffalo, relating to a grand Tournament for firemen to be held in that city on Monday, Tuesday and Wednesday, Aug. 10th, 11th, and 12th.

The communication was road by Foroman Redditt and received.

After a discussion on the matter resolutions were passed that this Brigade take part in the hose reel race and hook and ladder race, provided the funds will admit.

Messrs. Savage, Pugsley and Redditt were appointed a committee to enquire into the funds of the Company, the fare to Buffalo and other expenses necessary and to report on Tuesday evening.
