### The Crops.

The reports from London on the west to Whitty bring to the east of us, show that the spring crops of all kinds are unusually heavy this year. The bulk of straw in fall wheat is more than an average, but the yield of grain in some places will be considerably lessened owing to the rust.

### Heavy Rain.

Early Monday morning, the rain commenced pouring, and continued with slight intervals all during the day. Unfortunately it came right in the midst of barley harvest, and will cause great damage to crops throughout the county. It does not take a very heavy rain to knock ten or twelve cents a bushel off barley.

### Scotland's Songs.

### Raspberry Festival.

Last Friday evening the ladies of the Presbyterian church held their Raspberry Festival at the residence of Dr. Jas. Langstaff. The grounds were neatly decorated with Chinese lanterns, and everything passed off very pleasantly. The raspberries, ice cream and other delicacies were nicely served up by attentive waiters, and gave good satisfaction. The proceeds amounted to about \$30.

### Lacrosse.

Our light-weight lacrosse players, the "White Roses," mounted on a high-toned chassis started for Patterson on Tuesday afternoon to cross sticks with the junior club of that place. The game was very exciting, but the home team were too heavy for their light but agile opponents, and defeated them by three games to one after about an hour and a half's play. We have not heard the amount of money which changed hands. The return match will be played here shortly.

### Buffalo Fire Tournament.

The Richmond Hill Fire Brigade have been asked to take part in a fire tournament in Buffalo, commencing on Monday next. Valuable prizes are offered in several departments, which, with practice, our firemen would stand a good chance of capturing, but the notice given being so short it has been decided not to take part. We should like to see the Brigade practice regularly, so as to be in a position to enter a contest at any time, in which case we would expect to see the company's funds strengthened before this season is over.

### Noxious Weeds.

This is the time of year to cut and get rid of all kinds of noxious weeds, before going to seed. The principal streets of the village are pretty free from those troublesome and useless vegetable productions, but some of the back streets need looking after. Cut them, and it will put an end to the trouble, not only to those who have a right to do the work, but to those whose duty it is to see that the By-Law relating to the same is enforced. This suggestion might also be acted upon by the farming community in this vicinity, in regard to Canadian thistles.

### Toronto's Fire.

Probably the largest fire which has ever visited Toronto broke out between 12 and 1 o'clock Monday morning, and continued its ravages for several hours. It originated in the large sugar refinery on the Esplanade, burning all the boat houses and many of the vessels along the water's edge. The loss is estimated at half a million dollars. A night-watchman perished in the flames. It is supposed he caused the fire by leaving his oil lamp drop, and perished in attempting to subdue the flames. Others have an idea it was caused by spontaneous combustion.

### Misleading.

A correspondent from Patterson writes to the *Globe and Mail* newspapers saying that a lacrosse match was played there on Tuesday last between the Richmond Hill and Patterson clubs, and that Patterson captured the laurels, defeating the visitors by three games to one. Those who never saw the clubs play would take it for granted that the "Young Canadians" have been defeated by the Patterson team, whereas the victory was gained over a team composed of "Kids" 10 and 12 years of age, known as the "White Rose" club. The account is not only misleading to the public but is malicious. The writer may look upon it as a joke, but it is a poor way to endeavor to build up the reputation of a lacrosse club.

### School Board Meeting.

The Richmond Hill School Board met for the transaction of business on Tuesday afternoon. Mr. R. Marsh, chairman of the Board, presided. Members present, Messrs. Patterson, Boyle, Brown, Trench, Duncan, Naughton, Skeels, Switzer and Dr. Wilson. The minutes of last meeting were read, and on motion confirmed. On motion of Mr. Trench, seconded by Mr. Brown, the Board inspected the Public School buildings to ascertain what repairs were necessary to put them in proper condition. Mr. Trench moved, seconded by Mr. Patterson, that the chairman, secretary, and the treasurer be a committee to look up the law on School Trustee Elections, and report at next meeting.—Carried. Moved by Mr. Duncan, seconded by Mr. Skeels, that the committee of management be instructed to patch the roofs, doors, and windows of the school rooms, and make the necessary repairs. It was then moved as an amendment by Mr. Naughton, seconded by Dr. Wilson, that the said committee of management be instructed to make the necessary repairs in two of the three back rooms in the Public School to be occupied during the winter, the outlay not to exceed \$75. The amendment was carried. The Board adjourned to meet on the first Tuesday in September.

### FIRE BRIGADE MEETING.

A special meeting of the Richmond Hill Fire Brigade was held in the Council Chamber on Saturday evening, Aug. 1st. There were over thirty members present.

Messrs. C. Trevothan, G. Kidd, C. E. Sheppard and F. McConaghy, jr., were proposed and accepted as firemen.

The Lieutenant then stated that the meeting was in reference to a communication from Buffalo, relating to a grand Tournament for firemen to be held in that city on Monday, Tuesday and Wednesday, Aug. 10th, 11th, and 12th.

The communication was read by Foreman Reddit and received.

After a discussion on the matter resolutions were passed that this Brigade take part in the hose reel race and hook and ladder race, provided the funds will admit.

Messrs. Savage, Pugsley and Reddit were appointed a committee to enquire into the funds of the Company, the fare to Buffalo and other expenses necessary, and to report on Tuesday evening.

It was requested that the Hose Reel and Hook and Ladder Companies start practice on Monday evening.

The meeting then adjourned.

The Brigade met according to special arrangement on Tuesday evening, Aug. 4th.

The minutes of previous meeting were read and adopted.

Mr. Savage reported that the committee appointed for that purpose had looked into the finances of the Company and found that about \$95 was on hand. As no reply had been received from Buffalo in reference to car fare, &c., the meeting adjourned till Wednesday evening.

The adjourned meeting of the Brigade was held on Wednesday evening. Lieut. Pugsley in the chair.

No answer from Buffalo had been received in reference to their tournament. It was moved by fireman Snider, seconded by fireman McLean, that the Hose Reel Company be sent to take part in the tournament.

Moved as an amendment by fireman Derry, seconded by fireman Kirkland, that owing to the short notice we do not send any part of the Brigade.—The amendment carried.

The meeting adjourned.
