Gentlemen:-I beg to submit the following with regard to the attendance, progress, &c. of the High School.

During the academical year ending July 1885 we sent up two candidates for the Civil Service Examination both of whom were successful. At the Departmental Examinatins for teachers' certificates seventeen candidates presented themselves, ten of whom were successful, viz., six obtained Second Class Certificates(two grade A and four grade B) and four obtained third class. When it is taken into consideration that only 19 per cent of the candidates throughout the province were succe-sful, our school maintains its usual high standing.
