**Serious Accident.**  
 It is with painful feelings we inform our readers of a very serious accident which happened to Mr. Geo. Trench on Tuesday afternoon, by which he lost four fingers and the greater part of his left hand. His regular vocation is running the engine in Trench's steam carriage works, but at this particular time he was planning a short piece of board with the buzz plane, which revolves at a terrific rate by means of steam. When the whizzing plane came in contact with a knot, it threw the board back, and caused his hand to go forward among the knives, which instantly effected the cruel deed. Dr. Langstaff was immediately sent for, and after administering chloroform, dressed and bandaged the wounded limb. He is doing as well as can be expected, but has suffered greatly since the accident occurred. If an inward feeling of tender sympathy could relieve George of this sad misfortune, every citizen of our village would speedily come to the rescue. But we fear he is destined to spend many months before he will be able to resume manual labor of any character.
