FIRE BRIGADE MEETING.

Minutes of regular meeting of Richmond Hill Fire Brigade held in the Council Chamber, on Friday evening, Nov. 6th. Lieut. Pugsley in the chair.

Minutes of last meeting read and on motion adopted.

A communication from F. W. Rose was read, having reference to lamps taken by the Maitland Lacrosse Club on the evening of Civic Holiday.

Moved by C. E. Sheppard, seconded Ed. Snider, that citizens committee be charged with the six lamps taken by parties from Toronto. The committee having borrowed them for the occasion, this brigade holds them responsible and looks to them for payment—Carried.

Foreman Redditt suggested that some amusement ought to be provided for Thanksgiving Day, in the shape of matches, &c., in the different departments of the brigade.

Acting on this suggestion, James McConnell moved, seconded by C. Trevethan, that we proceed to arrange a programme for the afternoon of Thanksgiving Day, only members of brigade to take part therein.—Carried.

C. Trevethan moved, seconded by W. Storey, that this brigade resolve itself into a committee of the whole to arrange programme.—Carried.

Mr. W. Storey in the chair.
The following programme was arranged and accepted by the brigade.

Brigade shall turn out in full parade with all fire appliances at 1 o'clock sharp. Hose reel race, (8 men on a side) similar to one run on Oct. 17th.

Hook and ladder race (12 men to compose a team.)
Coupling match.

Teams of 12 men to run a certain distance to engine and get same in working order.

Teams of 6 men run from a certain point to engine, attach hose and lay out same, all couplings tight and fit for wet practice.

Tug-of-war, 10 men on a side, Messrs. J. Brownlee and E. Glover, captains.

On motion, the Lieutenant, Foreman Redditt and W. Storey were appointed a committee to arrange all the preliminaries for the races, &c.

W. Storey vacates the chair and the Lieut. re-takes the same.

The silver mounted coupling keys, which were presented by Rev. W. F. Wilson and Lieut. Pugsley, as a prize for the best couplers were handed to the Lieut. by Foreman Redditt to be presented to the successful competitors, W. Storey and J. Piper.

Our worthy Lieut. in a few appropriate remarks presented the keys to the winners, Messrs. Storey and Piper.

Messrs. Storey and Piper replied in suitable terms, thanking the donors of the prize.

Moved by Foreman Savage, seconded by Foreman Redditt, that a vote of thanks be tendered to the Rev. W. F. Wilson and W. H. Pugsley for their handsome gift.—Carried.

W. H. Pugsley thanked the brigade for the vote, both on his own and on Mr. Wilson's behalf.

Moved by Foreman Redditt, seconded by C. E. Sheppard, that during the winter months at the regular meetings a coupling match take place of half an hour's duration, among the members.—Carried.

Moved by J. McConnell, seconded by Foreman Savage, that a resolution of sympathy be tendered to fireman George Trench by this brigade, for his late affliction.—Carried.
