Division Court.

Third Division Court was held in the
Court House here, last Saturday. His
Honor Judge Morgan presiding.

The number of cases on the docket
was unusually large, but several were
settled before the court met.

The first was J. E. Willmot vs. John
Henrick, in which the former sued the
latter for \$6.25 in lieu of statute labor
performed according to defendant's order.
Judgment was given against the defend-
ant. Mr. A. G. F. Lawrence was counsel
for plaintiff.

Another case was McCague vs. Mun-
shaw. In this there appeared to have
been a misunderstanding about a contract
of building. Mr. McCague claimed \$71-
.83; the judge granted him \$56.83. Mr.
Haverson acted for plaintiff.

In a garnishee suit of Mason against
Wrights & Patterson & Bro. garnishees,
it was found on examination that nothing
was due to the plaintiff.

A youth named Harry Shenfield sued
a farmer named Geo. Robinson for \$38,
being balance of wages. Robinson put in
an affidavit for board, driving for the doc-
tor, &c., whilst the plaintiff was lying ill
in his house. Judgment for full amount
was given against Robinson.

Several cases of judgment summons
were before the court, some of which
were dismissed, and in others the judge
decided in favor of the plaintiff.

The court adjourned till Saturday, the
11th of Sept. next.
