Our Toronto Letter.

The French Invasion.—Campaigning in
the Pavilion.—Shaftesbury Hall
Politics.—A short account of
some things.

The old war cry of Protestantism in
danger, a foolish piece of business at the
best, is being dinned, with the most pro-
voking barefacedness, into one's ear on
the street, from the platform, and by the
column in the newspaper. The *Mail* de-
votes to-day three columns to a review
of opinions uttered many centuries ago;
doubtless very interesting reading, though
it must be confessed, a little tiresome to
its readers who are not much concerned
with what fighting polemics of the seven-
teenth century said or thought. The Jan-
isaries of Canadian politics enjoy this
work. Every sort of badness comes into
full play when a proceeding of this kind
is on foot. J. L. Hughes the School In-
spector, is a notable specimen of the mis-
chievous production. Disappointed in
efforts for employment under Mr. Mowat,
he turned over to the Opposition, like the
mercenary of the middle ages, who, on
promise of increased pay, changed his side
as easily as a man would change his coat,
providing he had a change.

Another specimen of this pestiferous
class of beings is the *Mail* correspondent
now writing up the French settlements in
Prescott and Russell counties. One of
the misfortunes of modern society in con-
nection with the press is the amount of
harm that lies within the scope of evil
disposed persons under the cover of an-
onymity. What a blessing if everyone
who assumes to teach the people were ob-
liged to appear in broad daylight. Such
is the custom in France, and who will de-
ny its efficacy in the prevention of impos-
ture. Very little attention would be paid
to the efforts of the *Mail* if it were gen-
erally known that the writer of its most
violent anti-Catholic articles is himself a
professed Catholic, and as such cannot be-
lieve a word of what he says. This cor-
respondent I have referred to is of that
type of writers who usually modify their
notions of things so as to bring them into
line with the views of the party or parties
for whom at that moment they may work.
An amusing story is current in certain
circles about this correspondent. On his
arrival in this country from a certain fam-
ous city in the north of Ireland, he made
himself popular in Home Rule circles by
proclaiming himself in unmistakable lan-
guage a "converted loyalist." However,
there being no vacancy on the staff of a
certain paper he quietly dropped his
ideas on Home Rule and in a very little
while after became attached to the *Mail*
staff, and strange to say, is to-day one
of the bitterest Loyalists in the city. Of
course he may have learned the error of
his ways. Some think otherwise. His
letters to the *Mail* are gems of their kind.
For instance, one of his most serious com-
plaints against the Canadians is their lib-
erality in church money matters. Con-
sidering that timber limits and such will
not last for ever, it is only natural for the
Conservative boodlers to look askance.
He says French Canadians are in the habit
of raising large families. Mr. Mowat is
clearly in fault here. What has he
been doing that this state of things is al-
lowed to continue. Unfortunately for this
delightful theory, the figures of the last
census prove (as quoted by a writer lately
in the *Globe*) that the native population
of Ontario has increased within the last
decade in a much greater degree than the
native population of Quebec. He also
shows that Quebec contains a much larger
proportion of English speaking popula-
tion than Ontario does of the French.

Failing any real grounds of complaint
against the Mowat Administration, he
drops to the low level of abuse and mis-
representation of Catholic dogmas and
practices. Surely the impertinence of
this and other trivialities too childish to
mention, is enough to make sensible folk
blush with shame for the want of sense
in one of the superior race. Frenchmen
may be inclined to consider the advisa-
bility of putting all possible barriers be-
tween them and amalgamation with such
a race.

OAK RIDGES.

From our own Correspondent.
On Monday evening, Dr. Widdifield
addressed a meeting of the electors at
Bell's Hotel, Bond's Lake. Col Wyndham,
his opponent, having been invited and
promising to attend, the Dr. did not
commence the meeting until his arrival,
consequently it was nearly 9 o'clock p. m.
when the meeting was called to order.
Mr. Ross, of King, was elected chairman,
which position he ably filled. Owing to
the lateness of the hour the Dr. & Col.
agreed to limit their speeches to one half
hour each. Dr. Widdifield saying that
the hall was so cold that it would not be
advisable to keep the meeting up to a late
hour, and the stalwart Col remarking that
he might make it colder for his opponent
yet before he got through. Dr. Widdifield
addressed the meeting first, and
plainly stated his views on the questions
of the day, and ably defended himself and
the Mowat Government against the
various charges trumped up against
them; he spoke about 35 minutes. Col.
Wyndham then, in a speech of about 25
minutes told the audience he had a very
bad cold, and was very hoarse. Of this
fact he reminded them at least ten times;
he also told them several times that he
was a poor farmer and not much of a hand
at speech making. We might mention
that the latter has been the failing of
several of the candidates who have op-
posed Dr. Widdifield in past elections,
probably owing to the fact that they had
not much to speak about. The Col. can
hardly be called a straight Tory as he
claims to advocate several things which
the Reformers have worked for in past
years and are still working for. However
he said he was up in the North West with
the volunteers during the late rebellion,
and he condemns the French domination,
because if the French had had their way
they would have shot all the volunteers
and himself included. Well the brave
Col. had a narrow escape, anyway. So
he said it was the Riel question that
brought him out. If that is the case we
think he ought to have come out before
Riel went in.

Mr. Taylor, a lawyer of Aurora, the
founder of the Young men's Liberal club
of Toronto and E. J. Davis, Reeve of
King, spoke about 15 minutes on the
separate School question, Manhood suf-
frage, the Boundary award and other
matters showing how false and flimsy are
the charges and pretences of the Con-
servative party, and also that the Riel
question was not the Real question of the
day. Col. Wyndham and his friends
found it so cold or perhaps hot, that they
left before Mr. Davis got through speak-
ing. We think they will find it bitterly
cold on the 28 of this month.
