School Board meeting.

The Richmond Hill School Board met in the High School Room, on Monday, January 17th. In absence of Mr. Marsh, Mr. J. Brown took the chair. Members present, Messrs. Duncan, Savage, Trench, Glass, McConaghy, Switzer and Dr Wilson. The minutes of last meeting read and confirmed. The following bills were passed and ordered to be paid: Jos. Hall, for Public School, \$3.30; Jos. Hall, for High School, 40 cents; Jas Brownlee, for Public School, \$1.45; Jas Brownlee, for High School, 85 cents; Rent for Temperance Hall, Public School, \$4.00; T. H. Redditt, High School, \$1.95; C. Mason, \$18.75; T. F. McMahon, for Public School, \$5.94; T. F. McMahon, for High School 25 cents; Arbitrators re Union S. Section \$48.20. The committee appointed to confer with a committee of Masons reported. The latter asked for \$52.50 damages done to the Hall while occupied as a High School. The board feeling it was too high, it was moved by Mr. Trench, seconded by Dr. Wilson, that the committee previously appointed endeavor to affect a satisfactory settlement—Carried. The committee was also instructed to rent the Temperance Hall for six months, for the junior division of the Public School. Mr Duncan was opposed to renting the Hall, till he knew what terms were to be given the outsiders: A discussion ensued in which several members had the floor at the same time. The meeting adjourned.

Pursuant to the statute the following members, elected to compose the Municipal Council of the corporation of the village of Richmond Hill for the year 1887—Viz: Wm H. Pugsley, Reeve; Peter G. Savage, Jos. H. Hall, Wm A. Sanderson, Levi Gaby, Councillors, met in the Council Chamber on the 17th inst., at 11 a. m. and having made and subscribed their respective declarations of qualification and of office, took their seats.

The Reeve in the chair. The clerk read the minutes of the last meeting of the Council, January 10th, which were approved.

Mr. Savage introduced By-Law No 121 to appoint auditors, High school Trustee, three members of the Board of Health, an Assessor, and other officers, to serve the corporation for the year 1887.

The By-Law was read a first and second time.

The Council went into a committee of the whole on the By-Law. Mr. Hall in the chair.

The committee rose and reported the By-Law with the following blanks filled up as follows:—Auditors, Messrs J. K. Falconbridge and Parker Crosby; High School Trustee, Mr. J. A. E. Switzer; Local Board of Health, Messrs. W. J. Wilson, M. D. Henry Miller, and Wm. Bricknell; Medical Health officer, Dr. W. J. Wilson; Sainitary Inspector, Jas Brownlee; Assessor, John W. Elliott; Village Inspector, and Janitor of the schools, Jas Brownlee; Fence Viewers, Jas Freck, John W. Elliott, and Wm. Bricknell; Bell Ringer Francis Wiley.

The By-Law was read a third time and passed.

Moved by Mr. Savage, seconded by Mr. Sanderson, that the Treasurer is hereby instructed to pay to M. Teffy the amount of \$3.60, certified by the Registrar General's Department, being the statutory fee for registration of births, marriages and deaths, during the past year—Carried.

The following standing committee were struck:—Fire & Water, Messrs. Savage, Gaby and Hall; Streets and sidewalks, all the members in the Council; Public Park, Sanderson, Savage, and Gaby; Finance Committee, Hall, Sanderson and Savage; By-Laws, Sanderson and Hall.

The Council adjourned to meet on Monday, the 14th of February at 8 p. m.
