### Property Inspected.

### The Fleming By-Law passed.

The citizens of Toronto are determined to reduce the drink traffic. Last Monday evening the Fleming By-Law was passed by a small majority. After the 1st of May next, the number of taverns will be reduced from 223 to 150 for the coming year. It is instructive to note that in the majority of 19 there were only two who availed themselves of the By-Law, and that among the minority of 17 there were twelve Conservatives. It will be remembered that this by-law was rejected by the old Council a few months ago.

In the absence of the President, Mr. Elijah Armstrong, the chair was filled by Mr. Andrew Battigate, while Mr. John Heslop, the Vice-President, occupied the vice-chair. Among those who made speeches were Dr. Webster, of York Mills; Mr. G. Wood, the ex-President; Mr. S. T. Members present; Messrs. Alex. Malloy, (Reeve), Andrew Russell, Isaac Reaman, George High and Peter Devins.

The Reeve in the chair.

The minutes of previous meeting were read and on motion sustained.

A petition was presented by Mr. A. Russell, from C. Warer and 27 other, rate-payers of the village of Kleinburg, praying to be formed into a separate road beat, and that their statute labor be laid out on the streets and sidewalks of Kleinburg.

Moved by Mr. Russell, seconded by Mr. Reaman, that the Treasurer be and is hereby authorized to pay the following account:—

Dist. No. 1—W. R. Proctor, balance of account drawing gravel, \$30.00—Carried.

Moved by Mr. Reaman, seconded by Mr. Devins, that the Treasurer be authorized to pay to Peter S. Gibson for services as Township engineer \$64 50—Carried.

Moved by Mr. Reaman, seconded by Mr. Russell, that the Treasurer be authorized to pay the account of Peter S. Gibson, for services re ditches and water courses act, for attendance and services, Marsh's swamp.—Carried.

Moved by Mr. Reaman, seconded by Mr. Devins, that the Treasurer be authorized to pay J. J. Cameron \$4.00 for wood &c., for the Town Hall—Carried.

Moved by Mr. High, seconded by Mr. Devins, that the Treasurer be and is hereby authorized to pay to Robert McLean Sen. the sum of \$12.00 for board and attendance on Mrs. Delany—Carried.

Moved by Mr. Reaman, seconded by Mr. Devins, that the Treasurer be authorized to refund to J. P. Rupert for being erroneously assessed for one dog, for the year 1886, \$100; also to Mr. R. Rumble on Health Inspector \$2.00—Carried.

The petition of the ratepayers of the village of Kleinburg was laid over till next meeting, for further consideration.

Moved by Mr. High, seconded by Mr. Reaman, that the Clerk be and is hereby instructed to let Peter Savage, Returning officer for West York, have the ballot boxes belonging to this Township upon his agreeing to return the same two days after the elections.

By-Law, No. 519 was then passed appointing the Local Board of Health &c. for the Township under the "Public Health Act of 1887" as follows:—Messrs. Alex. Malloy (Reeve) James M. Lawrence (Clerk) J. P. Rupert, Alex. Gough and Dr. R. B. Orr members of the Board Medical Health officer, Dr. R. B. Orr and Mr. Robert Rumble, Sanitary Inspector.
