Polling in Richmond Hill.

The polling in the village on Tuesday last was very satisfactory to the Reformers. Mr. Wallace has long looked upon this place as a Conservative stronghold. In a late issue the York Herald prophesied a majority of 25. Many of the level beads had put it down from 15 to 18. The result, however, showed a decided change in public opinion. The number polled was very large. Out of a total of less than 200, 183 voters marked their bailots. On counting, the Deputy Returning Officer gave the result follows-For Wallace, 93 ; for Lynd, 90 ; majority for the former, 3.


