### School Board Meeting.

The Richmond Hill Board of Education held its regular Monthly Meeting on Monday, March the 7th.

Members present; Messrs. Brown, Savage, Glass, McConaghy, Russell, Naughton, Lynett, Switzer, Trench, Duncan and Dr. Wilson.

Mr. J. Brown (Chairman) presided. The minutes of previous meeting were read and confirmed.

A communication from Inspector Davidson was read, stating that the Municipal Grant for Vaughan part of school section was ready.

Messrs. Brown and McConaghy reported that a meeting of the rate-payers of the village had been held, at which it was recommended that in case of the Union being maintained, the village would agree to raise 2/3 of the taxes, leaving 1/3 to be raised by the outside parts of the school section. A resolution was in accordance with the recommendation placed on the books. The members present representing the outsiders, with the exception of Mr. Duncan thought this arrangement would be satisfactory.

Mr. Pugsley (Reeve) who was present reminded the Board that the contract with Mr. Brownlee, as caretaker, of the schools expired on the first of the present month, and that he wished to know what was their wish in reference to the coming year.

Mr. Duncan moved, seconded by Mr. McConaghy, that this Board offer the village Council the sum of \$200. (the same as last year) for caretaking—Carried. On motion of Mr. McConaghy, seconded by Mr. Savage, the Secretary and Treasurer were instructed to discount a note of \$200 for 3 months, with the Central Bank, Richmond Hill.

The meeting adjourned to meet on Monday the 14th inst.
