meeting was held in Victoria Hall Union-
ville on Saturday, the 12th inst., at 2 p.
m., to consider the views of the electors
of Markham as to the manner of main-
taining the York Roads.
The meeting appointed Jno. Stephenson,
Esq., as chairman, and D. James, ex-
Reeve as Secretary.
B. Bruce, Esq., first addressed the meet-
ing, and in a most interesting and in-
formative manner discussed the
York Roads by a system of graded tax-

read and on motion sustained.

Lots 30 to 35, on the 10th Con.
Moved by Mr. Reaman, seconded by
Mr. Russell, that the Treasurer be and is
hereby authorized to pay the following

for repairing the fence enclosing the Town
Hall grounds—Carried.

Moved by Mr. Reaman, seconded by
Mr. Russell, that the Treasurer is hereby

cal attendance on Mrs Rutledge, for frac-
ture of arm—Carried.
Moved by Mr. Reaman, seconded by
Mr. Russell, that, owing to the abuse of
the Town Hall by parties holding enter-
tainments, it be not granted for any such
purposes in the future, on any considera-
tion—Carried.
Moved by Mr. Reaman, seconded by
Mr. Russell, that the auditors' Report
for 1886 be received and adopted by this
Council, and that the Clerk is hereby
authorized to have 300 copies printed in
the usual manner to be divided among
the several Councillors for distribution.
—Carried.

The petitions presented were laid over
till next meeting.
By-Law No. 511 was then passed, as-
sessing the Township of Roads & Bridges
&c.
The Council adjourned to meet on
Tuesday the 12th day of April, 1887.

York Road Discussed.
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Reeve as Secretary.
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ing, and in a most interesting and in-
formative manner discussed the
York Roads by a system of graded tax-

tion, higher near the roads, and gradually
smaller until the rear of the township was
reached.
G. R. Vanzant, Reeve of Markham
Village, was opposed to taxation by the
County for the maintenance of the Roads.
A. Forster, Deputy Reeve, was in favor
of the Municipalities through which, and
along side of which they run, maintaining
them.
W. Scott, Esq., was in favor of those
municipalities interested in the roads, be-
ing taxed to maintain them.
J. Stater, Esq., was in favor of retain-
ing the tolls upon the roads.
J. B. Gould, Deputy Reeve, was also
in favor of tolls.
Short addresses were also made by W.
Pugsley, Esq., Reeve of Richmond Hill,
Duncan, of York Township, W. H.
Lundy, and D. James.
It was moved by D. James, and seconded
by W. Scott, and Carried.

That this meeting is of the opinion that
the York Roads should be continued in
their present efficient state of repair and
be under the control and supervision of
the York Co. Council.
Another motion was carried to the effect
that the tolls should be continued upon
the roads which upon motion afterwards
was reconsidered. A meeting will be
held in June for further consideration of
the subject.
The meeting was quite a representative
gathering but not so large as desirable,
only about sixty being present.
