## NEWS ITEMS.

Efforts are being made to induce Mr.  
O'Brien, editor of the *United Ireland*, to  
come to Canada, and deliver a course of  
lectures, in reference to Lord Lansdowne  
as an Irish landlord.

Three men were hanged last Thursday  
who were concerned in the attempt to as-  
sassinate the Czar of Russia on the 18th  
of March. Another attempt has since  
been made on his life.

Hon. Mr. Mowat announced in the  
Legislature last Friday afternoon  
that a measure giving manhood suffrage  
will be introduced in time for the next  
Provincial Elections.

In Mr. Balfour's bill in the Ontario  
Legislature to amend the law of libel, the  
plaintiff in all actions for libel in news-  
papers shall be required to prove either  
actual malice or culpable negligence in  
the publication of the matter complained  
of, except in cases where special damages  
are claimed.

A fatal accident occurred near Elora  
on the 1st of April. A man was driving  
a horse near the R. R. track, when the  
animal became unmanageable and jumped  
on a flat car while the train was going  
ten miles an hour. The horse was unin-  
jured, but the driver, who was dragged  
among the wheels, received injuries from  
which he has since died.

A petition has been filed against Sir  
John A. Macdonald, asking that his re-  
cent election in Kingston be declared  
void, and also that he be declared in-  
eligible to sit in the House of Commons for  
the term of seven years, as provided by  
the act. This is the first petition filed in  
Ontario in connection with the late Do-  
minion Elections.

True bills have been found by the  
Grand Jury against Hood, Malcolm and  
Lapp, of the township of Markham, in  
connection with the late Dominion Elec-  
tion in East York. The first named was  
committed for bribing on behalf of Alfred  
Louthes, the last two for conspiring  
against the former. When Hood's case  
was brought before the petit jurors they  
disagreed. The trial against Malcolm  
and Lapp will probably be postponed.

## Sidewalks on Yonge St.

To the Editor of THE LIBERAL:  
MR. EDITOR—Is there a prospect of a  
sidewalk being made this year on Yonge  
Street between Richmond Hill and  
Thornhill?

Your readers interested will recollect  
that last year the Vaughan Council pass-  
ed a By-Law to allow the ratepayers and  
others residing on the 1st Con., to ex-  
pend one half of their statute labor in  
building a foot-path, or sidewalk, on  
Yonge Street. Some time previous, I  
understand, a By-Law for the same pur-  
pose was passed by Markham Council.  
These By-Laws were passed in compli-  
ance with applications made from time  
to time by ratepayers interested, and  
the reason why the work was not proceed-  
ed with last year was because nearly all  
the statute labor had been expended before  
the Vaughan By-Law had been passed.

Now, Sir, soon our Path-masters for  
the present year will be appointed, and if  
the work is to be proceeded with this  
year, the respective Path-masters would  
do well to proceed with all convenient  
speed to have the preliminary arrange-  
ments made. You know, Sir, that Yonge  
Street is under the jurisdiction of the  
County Council, but by their By-Law  
No. 439 authority is given, under certain  
conditions, for the construction of side-  
walks or foot-paths on their roads, one  
of the conditions being that all sidewalks  
so constructed must be done to the satis-  
faction of the Superintendent of York  
Roads.

A sidewalk on Yonge Street has been  
long talked of, and it is admitted on all  
hands that such would be a great conveni-  
ence, particularly in spring and fall, to  
those living on Yonge Street.

Surely no reasonable objection can be  
raised to it, and now let our "Men of  
Light and Leading" move themselves to  
have this, another reform, carried out.

## Fire Brigade Meeting.

The regular monthly meeting of the  
Richmond Hill Fire Brigade was held in  
the Council Chamber on Friday evening,  
April 1st.

Cap. Pugsley in the chair.  
Minutes of last regular meeting read  
and confirmed.

W. Cooper, Duncan McKenzie, W. S.  
Snider, Alex. Comisky, candidates for  
admittance into the Brigade, were then  
ballotted for. The chairman appointed  
Foreman Redditt and Fireman Sheppard  
scrutineers, and Fireman Brownlee and  
Lieut. Wilson distributors of ballots.  
The ballots were passed for the respect-  
ive candidates, and found favorable in  
each case.

A communication was read by the Sec.  
from Dundas extending an invitation to  
this Brigade to visit that town on the  
24th of May, as the guests of the Dundas  
Brigade.

Lieut. Wilson moved, seconded by  
Foreman Savage, that the Sec'y be in-  
structed to reply, declining the invitation  
with thanks.—Carried.

Communication from Orillia inviting  
Brigade to take part in a tournament to  
be held in that town on June 21st.  
Moved by Foreman Redditt, seconded  
by Fireman McConaghy, that communi-  
cation be laid over for consideration and  
Sec'y reply to that effect.—Carried.

The matter relating to Fireman Ed.  
Snider was further laid over for a month.  
John Innes and Michael Brillinger  
were proposed by Fireman Wilson and  
Fireman Glover respectively, to be ballot-  
ed for at next meeting to become mem-  
bers of this Brigade.

Moved by Fireman Brownlee, seconded  
by Lieut. Wilson, that the question of  
uniforms be laid over for an indefinite  
period.—Carried.

After roll the members adjourned to  
the Lorne Hall and entered with great  
spirit into the hose contest, and consid-  
erably better time was made than last  
month.

## Village Council.

The Village Council met in the Council  
Chamber on Tuesday evening, April 5th.  
Members present, Messrs. Pugsley (Reeve)  
Sanderson, Savage, Gaby and Hall.

The Reeve in the chair.  
Minutes of meeting held on February  
25th read and approved.

The following accounts were read: From  
Mr. Singleton for shovelling snow 50cts.  
The Reeve, aid to tramps \$4.25. The  
Clerk 50cts.

On motion of Mr. Gaby, seconded by  
Mr. Sanderson the bills were ordered to  
be paid.

The Clerk read replies from Mr. John  
Van Nostrand and Mr. Henry Marsh in  
reference to a supply of plank and scant-  
ling.

The clerk stated that Robert Black Mc-  
Clary had not paid his taxes, and the ac-  
count had been forwarded to the county  
treasurer for collection.

Messrs. A. Coulter and S. Senie waited  
on the council in view of renting the Pub-  
lic Park for the Young Canadian Lacrosse  
Club for the coming season. They asked  
that the rent be made as low as possible.

A discussion arose as to whether the  
grand stand could be rented in connection  
with the ground. It was explained that  
it could not as it is still in the hands of a  
separate committee.

A committee composed of the Reeve  
and Messrs. Savage and Sanderson was  
appointed to make arrangements for rent-  
ing the Park, and to acquaint the Lacrosse  
club in a few days.

Mr. Savage, as chairman of the Fire  
and Water committee gave a report con-  
cerning the hose belonging to the council.  
He said that a quantity of the hose now  
on hand was in a bad condition, some  
which had been sent to Toronto for repair  
would be sent back as useless. There  
was only about 100 feet which could be  
called good. About 200 feet more had  
been ordered, and he would recommend that a survey be  
procured at once. The other matters  
discussed in Mr. Savage's report, favor-  
ing an outlay for hose.

On motion of councillor Sanderson the  
Fire and Water committee, consisting of  
Messrs. Savage, Hall and Gaby, were  
authorized to procure the arms necessary  
but not to exceed 150 feet.
