The Joint Stock Co.

During the last month endeavors have been made to secure the Wilson mill property, and arrangements have finally been completed by which the aforesaid, together with plant and raw material, have been purchased by a Joint Stock Company, consisting principally of the leading business men of the village. In order to obtain a clearer immediately so as to commence operations at once, the capital could not exceed \$5000. This amount, which consists of sixty shares at \$50 each, has been taken. The Company intend at no distant date to increase the capital to say \$10,000, and those of our citizens who have not yet taken stock may then have an opportunity of becoming shareholders. It is proposed to manufacture as a leading article the well-known Wilson Fanning Mill, the reputation of which is fully established in this part of the country. Other agricultural implements will also be manufactured, and in time repairing of all kinds will be attended to. The work will be proceeded with at once, and those farmers who are in need of a first-class fanning mill will do well to consult this company before purchasing elsewhere. It is the intention to get out several hundred for this season.
