Liquor Cases Dismissed.

On a charge laid before Mr. Jas. Eckardt, License Inspector for this district, the proprietors of the Palmer House and the Grand Central Hotel were taken to Unionville last Saturday on the supposition of having sold liquor during prohibited hours about three weeks ago. Mr. Miller, J. P., of Unionville tried the cases, and the Inspector watched closely for the prosecution. Both Hotel-keepers denied the charge, and the seven witnesses who gave evidence swore that they had received no strong drink at the time in question. No evidence was given to sustain the charges, so they were both dismissed. From what we can learn the accused were taken up merely on suspicion. We have no sympathy for those in the traffic who wittily break the law, or for a certain class who habitually hang round a hotel on Saturday nights and Sundays, at the same time it seems unfair to drag a person into a liquor case who may enter a hotel at certain times on legitimate business. When information is laid before the Inspector he is bound to take the matter up, therefore the informant should be cautious before he runs the risk of putting the county to expense for nothing.
