of Vaughan met in the Town Hall on
Thursday, the 26th day of May, 1887 at
10 o'clock a. m. as a court of Revision.

Members present, Messrs. Malloy, Rus-
sell, Reaman, High and Devins.
The members having taken and sub-
scribed the oath of office, the Reeve (Mr.
Malloy) took the chair when the follow-
ing appeals were laid before the court:
John Hart Jr., self, Personal property
overcharged.

Robert Robinson, self, overcharged on
lands.
Matthew East, self, wrongly assessed for
a bitch.
John Witty, self, Real property over-
charged.

George Bone, self, to be changed from
Lot 16, Con. 2, to Lot 40, Con. 1.
Alex Malloy, self, dog assessed, kill-
ed.

William Hicks, Jas. Forrester and self,
to have 4 acres assessed, \$400 taken from
his assessment and assessed to Jas. For-
rester.

The above appeals having been duly
considered it was moved by Mr. Russell,
seconded by Mr. Reaman that the Court
of Revision do now adjourn till June
21st—Carried.

The Council then met for general busi-
ness. The Reeve in the chair. All the
members present.
The minutes of last meeting were read
and on motion approved.
A petition was presented by Mr. High
from T. C. Ham and 19 others asking for
\$20 of the statute labor to be expended in
repairing side-walks in the village of Tes-

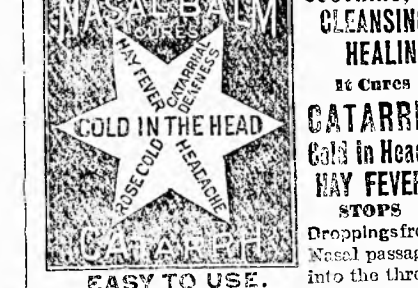
