The kind and pathetic words expressed towards the deceased brought tears to the eyes of many, and the solemn warning to the living should leave a lasting impression on his hearers.

**Agricultural Meeting.**  
 A meeting of the directors of the Richmond Hill and Yonge St. agricultural society was held in the Council chamber on Monday, May 30th, at 2 p. m. Present, Messrs. P. Patterson, President, Thos. Lloyd, 1st Vice Pres. Andrew Russell, 2nd Vice Pres., J. Palmer, T. Dobson, T. Palmer, J. Crosby, J. W. Elliott, T. Lawson, Edward Sander-on, Jas. Russell, A. Wright, Thos. Boynton, R. Holland, T. F. McMahon, W. Trench and R. Elliott. The minutes of last meeting were read and confirmed. In the absence of the secretary, who was ill, Mr. F. Marsh acted as such. An abstract of the assets and liabilities showed the former to be \$321.98 and the latter \$639.25, leaving a deficiency of \$317.27. On motion of Mr. Jas. Russell, seconded by Thos. Lloyd, Messrs. Trench, Crosby and J. Elliott were appointed a committee to wait on the Park Committee of the village council and ascertain if they would support a resolution in the council releasing the society from the obligation to pay \$40, for the use of the Village Park on the 21th of May. The committee withdrew and in a short time returned with an unfavorable report. Messrs. Trench, Crosby, J. Russell, J. Palmer and T. Boynton were then appointed a committee to devise some means of providing for the deficiency. The meeting then adjourned to meet on Saturday, June 11th at 2.30 p. m., when the report of the last named committee will be received.

### School Board Meeting.

A special meeting of the School Board was held on Friday afternoon, May 27th. Members present: Messrs. Duncan, Savage, Naughton, Switzer, Wilson, McConaghy, Brown, Trench, and Russell. The minutes of last regular meeting were read and confirmed.

A communication from Mr. M. H. Keefler was read, respecting the building of a tight board fence. By request the communication was laid over till next meeting.

T. F. McMahon presented a bill of \$2.00 for printing the school accounts for 1886. On motion the bill was ordered to be paid.

Mr. Redditt, Head Master of the High School, drew the attention of the Board to a paragraph in the *York Herald* of that day which stated that the members had been called together to investigate complaints preferred against one or both the Masters. As the statement was untrue, he said it was unjust to the teachers, and injurious to the reputation of the High School. He asked Mr. Keefler, who was present, where he had received his information. Mr. Keefler did not feel inclined to give the explanation asked for.

Mr. Brown (Chairman) had previously explained that the Board had been called together under rather painful circumstances, a High School pupil having been suspended for disobedience and insolence towards the Head Master. He said the case seemed all the more unfortunate as the charge was against the son of a trustee.

The Secretary then read the charge against Hugh McConaghy, which had been handed in by the Head Master.

A statement from Mr. Lent, the assistant teacher, to the Head Master, giving the origin of the trouble, was also read.

Mr. Redditt, Mr. Lent, and the pupil, were all heard respecting the matter under consideration. McConaghy did not deny being disobedient, but complained that he had been selected by Mr. Lent from among other pupils who were equally guilty with himself, that he was made, as it were, a scape-goat for the school.

A lengthy discussion followed, in which many of the trustees took part, but as much of it did not bear on the subject we think it better to withhold it from the public.

On motion of Mr. Russell, seconded by Mr. Duncan the head master was sustained in his suspension, but would allow McConaghy to take his place in the school on the following Monday, provided he would offer a verbal apology before the school, said apology to be satisfactory to the teachers.

The meeting then adjourned.
