The Master Bakers' Association of Hamilton has raised the price of bread from 10 to 12 cents per four pound loaf.

The Canadian Wimbledon team intend spending a week in Cambridge before taking ap their quarters at Wimbledon for practice.

Three thousand men will be employed by the Canadian Pacific Railway Company this season constructing snow-sheds in the Rocky Mountains.

It is now stated that Mr. Chapleau has definitely decided to accept the Lieutenant-Governorship of Quebec at the close of the present session.

The total amount of the defalsation of Parent, the absconding cashier of the lloche-laga Bank, of Montreal, is \$15,000 so far as known at present.

A landslide has occurred on Spitzen Mountain, Switzerland, which killed and wounded a number of persons, besides destroying much property.

The value of the produce of the fisheries of the Dominion for 1886 was \$18,679,283, an increase in the value of the produce of \$956,000, compared with 1885.

A scheme for bonusing cheese factories has been formulated by the Manitoba Gov-ernment, with the view of encouraging their maintenance in the province.

It is understood that important changes will be made in the position of officers of the Bank of Montreal in consequence of the election of Sir Donald Smith as president.

The first of the three Cunard steamers purchased by the Canadian Pacific Railway Company for its trans-Pacific fleet has left Yokohama, Japan, for British Columbia direct.

It is stated that the principal transatlantic steamship companies contemplate hring-ing their passengers direct to Montreal in-stead of landing them at Quebec as heretofore.

Great indignation is expressed by the supporters of Mr. Searth, M. P. for Winnipeg, at his action in the disallowance debate, and there is some talk of forcing him to resign.

A reduction of forty per cent. has been made by the Canadian Pacific authorities in freight rates between Winnipeg and Van-couver, Victoria, and New Westminster, Brittsh Columbia.

Hector McLeish, a Qu'Appelle settler, was shot and killed the other morning near Wolseley, N. W. T., by a party of four half-breed horse thieves whom he was endeavouring to arrest.

It is stated that Sir Donald Smith and Sir George Stephen are desirous of having a con-valescent home established at Banfi National Park in connection with the Royal Victoria Hospital, and will contribute another handsome sum for that purpose.

The work of digging the foundation of the new Canadian Pacific railway station in Montreal was commenced on Saturday, and tenders for the building will be called for immediately. The bridge at Lachine is ex-pected to be completed by Dominion day.

There is great excitement in Mattawa over the alleged discovery of rich gold bear-ing quartz in the hills opposite Mattawa, close to the north shore of the Ottawa river. Prospectors are busy at work blasting rock, and the villagers are filled with the belief that they have strack it rich. Some of the rock already assayed shows an average of between \$30 and \$13 worth of gold to the ton.

It is reported that Garcia Golan. Governor of the State of Ceahuila, Mexico, has been arrested and imprisoned by order of Diaz, pending an investigation into certain charges against him in relation to his alleged inaction regarding the killing of sever al soldiers by a band of smugglers.

Glowing accounts have been received at Fort Smith, Ark., of rich gold finds in the neighborhood of Golden City. Rich placer claims have been located, and are said to extend for six miles. Assays from the quartz mines show how from \$36 to \$59 per ton of free smelting gold. Large quantities of gray copper are also found in the mines.

A lamp explosion set fire to a small house at Oswego, N. Y., occupied by a Mrs. O'Brien and four children. Two aged five and seven of the children asleep, in an upper room, were burned to death. The third hild was badly burned, but will recover. The father, who was President of the 'Long-shoremen's Union, was drowned in a slip near his house three years ago.

At dawn on Monday, in Mexican terri-tory, the refuge of about thirty desperate bandits, thieves and smugglers were raided by forces from both sides of the river. A sharp fight ensued in which Col. Hernandez was wounded in the hand, one of his men was killed, and another wounded. One bandit was killed, several were wounded and a number were captured, several of whom, well known murderers, were execut ed on the spot. A large amount of stolen stock was found, most of which was returned

The Italian Chamber of Deputies have adopted a naval vote for \$5,000,000 lire, to be expended on ironclads, torpedoes and forts,

It is reported the Ghilzais have defeated a thousand of the Ameer's regular troops, captured five guns and a considerable quantity of baggage.

The Austrian War Department has rejected the proposal to form a balloon corps, on the grounds that its expense would counterbalance its slight usefulness.
