Stouffville v. Richmond Hill
The lacrosse match played on the Park
last Saturday, between the Stouffville
team and the 2nd twelve of the Young
Canadians, did not draw many spectators
from a distance. The teams were pretty
evenly matched, but the honors at the
close were given to the visiting team.

Mr. J. E. Addison, of Stouffville acted
as umpire for the Stouffville club, and
Mr J. Watson, of Maple, for the Young
Canadians. Mr. T. H. Redditt was the
referee.

The match was started at 4 15, the
home team playing up the slope. Play
in the first game was in favor of the
home team, which kept the ball the great-
er part of the time in the neighborhood
of the Stouffville flags, till Ross Haffey
sent it through after about 10 minutes' play.

The second game started after a few
minutes' rest and lasted a little longer
than the first. The rubber had been
worked down behind the Hill flags, when
it was dropped over in front and caught
by McConaghy, the goal-keeper, who
scored the game against his team, the
ball rolling down his stick.

The play in the 3rd game was a re-
petition of the first two. Several shots
were fired on the Stouffville flags, but
they were skilfully warded off by an ef-
ficient and cool-headed goal-keeper. Af-
ter a time the ball hovered down to the
other end of the field when it was put
through, thus scoring the 2nd game for
Stouffville.

After the 3rd game the eastern men
played better, and made every endeavor
to win. The play became somewhat
rougher on both sides, and the body
checking was pretty close. After a time
the game was secured by Searle for the
Y. C's.

The teams now had two games each,
and 38 minutes was left to finish the
match. The admirers for each side be-
gan to cheer lustily whenever their fa-
vorites did clever work, and this encour-
aged the contestants to put forth all their
strength to win. Finally a shot was
made on the Hill flags, and Mr. Addison,
the umpire, gave the game to Stouffville.
The Hill men protested against the de-
cision, claiming that the ball was caught
by McConaghy and tipped outside the
flags. Hard words were followed by
blows, most of which fell on the shoulders
of the peace-makers. After three cheers
were given for each club and the referee,
all left the field.

We might comment on the merits of
several players on both sides who did
good work. Manning scarcely ever came
out of a scrimmage second, and was gen-
erally in the right place at the right time.
Ross Haffey on the home team made fine
play and scarcely ever made a miss. If
Ross plays next season he should make a
desirable player on the first twelve.
